Peter Interprets Christ's Sufferings and Death

International Uniform Sunday School Lesson, March 22th, 1939

GOLDEN TEXT: "Christ also hath once suffered for sins, the just for the unjust, that he might bring us to God." 1 Peter 3: 18.

LESSON PASSAGE: 1 Peter 1: 17-23: 2: 20-25.

God's Plan, 17 - 21

In time Peter the Galilean fisherman became a theologian. Reflecting on his experience of Christ, his thoughts took orderly form. Clear convictions came to him about God and man. He interpreted the life and death of Christ as ordered in an eternal plan of God. The great events he had lived through were not due to blind chance but were rather the working of the long purpose of God. Peter had come to the conclusion that this universe was directed by intelligence and redemptive love. Trust in Christ led him to a philosophy of history. The Christian gospel is a challenge to the intellect. Peter, Paul and John sought to reason their way through to an understanding of the will of God concerning Christ. Today their is little hard theological thinking among average people. Our grandparents pondered the mysteries of creation, atonement, salvation, immortality, final destiny, but too many of their grandchildren are thinking in sports, actors, talking drama and comic strips. Peter challenge this readers to think in order that their faith and hope might be in God.

Our Part, 22, 23

Theology is related to life. Convictions grow out of our experience. God offers us redemption from sin through Christ but not apart from our own acceptance. Our souls are purified by obeying the truth of God and by our outgoing love to our fellowmen. We are born again by the living word of God coming into our minds, changing our attitudes and transforming our actions. The Christian way of life is self-help through God's help. One test of being born again is that we love one another with a pure heart fervently. We are enabled to live in the spirit of Christ when we accept the plan of God and by Christ's help seek to do our part of God's plan. Moses had his dream of a divine society on earth and he sought to establish it by laws. Peter had found a new motive power in the cross of Christ which worked an inner change in the nature of individuals so that hereafter they were new moral control through a quickening of soul.

Taking it, 20

Peter was writing to Christians facing persecution for their faith. He sought to encourage them to endure hardship courageously. Tradition tells of a sketch found in Roman military barracks. There is an ass's head upon a cross and underneath it this inscription: "Alexmenos worships his God." That was probably the mocking of some soldier at a Christian comrade. How should we bear ridicule and opposition? There is little credit due to us if we accept rebuke patiently when we are in the wrong. That is fairly easy. It is when our highest beliefs and purposes are mocked that we tend to retaliate and assert our superiority. Even though the social cleavage may bring ridicule and contempt only over such matters as Sabbath observance, early communion, total abstinence from liquor, aversion to swearing or refusal to laugh at an unclean jest, we should seek to carry ourselves as invulnerable to insult.

Christ's Example, 21 - 24

Quarrelling is so negative and socially so destructive that Christian people prefer to suffer injustice rather than be vindictive and seek revenge. Christians follow one who said, "Blessed are the peacemakers," "Love one another," "Put up thy sword." Christ did more than teach these truths; he lived them. He refused to allow his disciples to work vengeance on the Samaritans. He allowed himself to be arrested without

resistance. On the cross he prayed for forgiveness for those who did him to death. To gain a moral victory through love and self-control is a much higher triumph than to overcome an opponent through physical force. Again Peter found power for such moral victory through the cross. The sacrificial death of Christ awakens within us a strong desire to die to sin and to live unto righteousness. The selfless, hateless suffering of Christ has led us an example that we should follow in his steps. The example of Christ under attack is worthy of profound study by Christians in a year when the world is spending over seventeen billions of dollars upon armaments.

Shepherd and Bishop, 25

There are three great shepherd chapters in the Bible, the twenty-third Psalm, the thirty-fourth chapter of Ezekiel and the tenth chapter of John's Gospel. Peter, in a few words, reaches the heart of the shepherd analogy. We were as sheep going astray; but are now returned unto the Shepherd and Bishop of your souls." Christ is the Good Shepherd, our spiritual overseer. He touches our lives at our central need; he is the shepherd of our souls. Christ has earned the right to the title of the Good Shepherd. He did not work for money but for the good of people. He went after the people who were straying. He laid down his life for his fellowmen. The love of Christ's shepherd heart recalls us from our vagrant desires and leads us home to the fold of God. Would it not have been enough for Christ to have been the Great Teacher instructing his disciples in the truths of the kingdom? Christ did more than give his ideas; he gave himself. The Good Shepherd gave his life for the sheep.
