### Surprise Desserts

There are dozens of occasions during the year when the average woman wonders what to serve for dessert. She may be entertaining her sewing circle or her club. She may be preparing lunch for a children's party. She may be worrying about what to serve to those business friends who are coming to dinner with her husband. An unusual dish is desirable in a case like this. But it should be a dish that may be prepared earlier in the day, so that the full attention of the hostess may be devoted to her "hot dishes" when dinner time is approaching.

Here is an economical dish, easy to prepare, healthful and unusual. It requires no eggs, no baking and no boiling. It may be prepared as early in the morning as you wish. Try it!

- Honey-Nut Rennet-Custard
- 1 rennet tablet
- 1 tablespoon cold water
- 1 pint milk
- 3 tablespoons honey

Chop pecans and divide among dessert glasses. Dissolve the rennet tablet in cold water. Add honey to milk and warm to lukewarm in top of double boiler, stirring to be sure honey blends with milk. Remove from stove and add dissolved rennet tablet. Stir quickly for a few seconds; pour at once over the nuts. Let set until firm — about 10 minutes. Then chill in refrigerator. When ready to serve, garnish with whipped cream and honey.
