Faultless Easter Recipes

There is something in the spring air of Easter that calls for special foods — tempting foods, tantalizing foods, different dishes. And here they are! Just the tables you will want to place before your family and your friends when they sit at your table:

Gem Nut Salad
8 cups canned Hawaiian pineapple gems
1/2 cup mayonnaise dressing
1/4 cups finely chopped nuts
1/4 cups almonds, pecans or peanuts
6 canned or steamed dried figs (stuffed with cream cheese)
Chicory or romaine
2 cups orange sections
Drain pineapple gems — spoon size pieces cut from the juiciest part of the fruit — dry on absorbent paper, dip in mayonnaise and finely chopped nuts. For each serving arrange 1 stuffed fig on crisp chicory or romaine, surround with gems, and garnish with orange sections. Pass mayonnaise if desired. 6 servings.

Devilled Eggs in Aspic
1 package salad gelatin (aspic)
1 cup boiling water
1 cup cold water
3 hard cooked eggs
Mayonnaise
Seasonings
Dissolve salad gelatin in boiling water; add cold water. Chill until thick but not set.
Cut eggs in half crosswise, remove yolks, mash and season with salt, pepper, mayonnaise, mustard or other seasonings desired. Fill cavities in eggs and place outside down in shallow pan or individual moulds. Pour on thickened salad gelatin to cover. Chill until firm. Serve as salad or with cold steamed meat. Serves 6.

Creamed Limes
2 cups cooked, dried Limes
1 cupful cream (or milk)
2 tablespoons butter
2 tablespoons flour
1 bouillon cube
1/2 cupful boiling water
Additional seasoning to taste

Lamb Chops With Orange
8 lbs. veal or pork chops
Melted butter
Sliced oranges
Salt, pepper and paprika
Trim fat from thick chops and dip in melted butter. Oil broiler well and broil chops 9 minutes. Turn and place a thick slice of peeled orange on each chop. Broil 8 to 10 minutes longer. Sprinkle generously with the seasonings. Serve hot. Serves 6.

Chocolates Ice Cream
(Automatic Refrigerator Method)
1 square unsweetened chocolate
1/2 cup sweetened condensed milk
1/2 cup water
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup whipping cream
Melt chocolate in top of double boiler. Add sweetened condensed milk and stir over rapidly boiling water five minutes until mixture thickens. Add water and mix well. Chill thoroughly. Add vanilla. Whip cream to custard-like consistency and fold into chilled mixture. Pour into freezing pan. Place in freezing unit. After mixture is about half frozen, remove from refrigerator. Scrape from sides and bottom of pan. Beat until smooth but not stiff. Melted. Smooth out and replace in freezing unit until frozen for serving. Serves 6.
