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### GARDENING NOTES

#### NO HURRY

The average amateur starts operations days or sometimes weeks too soon and stops long before satisfactory operations can be continued. With the general run of vegetables and flowers, there is no advantage in getting things in while there is still danger of serious frost. One set-back from a cold day or two completely off-sets the early start and may indeed mean replanting the whole garden. This caution of course does not apply to the hardiest vegetables or flowers or to grass seed. These should be sown just as soon as grass is fit to work.

#### A SHORT CUT

For a short cut the gardener is advised to purchase a certain quantity of started plants of both flowers and vegetables. These are usually purchased from the greenhouse, florist or seed house. It is important to get the varieties wanted and on this account it is an excellent idea to consult a good Canadian seed catalogue before placing the order. The gardener can look over the various varieties offered in the catalogue and should make sure that the particular varieties wanted are in the boxes of plants bought.

Among the flowers which can be purchased as started plants are cosmos, chrysanthemums, petunias, marigolds, salpiglossis, nicotiana and a host of others. Cabbages, celery, tomatoes, head lettuce, egg and pepper plants in the vegetable line are all sold as started plants.

#### MOST FOR MONEY

Those with only a little land to spare should concentrate on those vegetables which give the biggest returns for the smallest space occupied. Among such kinds are beans, carrots, onions, lettuce, swiss chard, spinach, cucumbers and beets. In the lesser-known vegetables are leeks, egg and pepper plants, broad beans and coss lettuce. These can all be grown in almost any part of Canada. Experts advise the inclusion of something new in the vegetable line each year so that variety can be gradually widened.

### HOW TO TAKE SOIL SAMPLES

Many Ontario farmers will undoubtedly be taking advantage of free soil service provided by Ontario Department of Agriculture at seven stations. Here's how you do it.

Many Ontario farmers will undoubtedly be taking advantage this Spring of the free service provided by the Ontario Department of Agriculture to have samples of their soil tested. It is only by soil testing that farmers can ascertain just what plant constituents their soil lack to grow better quality and larger crops per acre. Here's how you do it.

1. Utensils needed: (a) A clean spade or shovel; (b) A clean basket, box or rust-free pail, and a large knife.

2. How to take a Representative Sample of Soil: (a) If the field is fairly uniform and is largely one type of soil, samples should be taken from at least ten points in the field. Where the soil in a field is uniform, one composite sample is sufficient. Where there are extreme knolls or low areas, these should be sampled separately.

(b) At each point in your field dig down to plow depth (5 to 7 inches) and throw aside this spadeful of soil. Next cut a thin slice down the face of the hole and while the soil is on the spade or shovel with a knife cut off the sides and about 1-2 inch of the bottom. Put the remainder of the slice in the pail or basket.

(c) If a subsoil sample is desired, clear back the soil where the first sample was taken to a depth of 8 inches, below where the first sample was taken. Put the subsoil samples in a separate pail (d) When samples have been taken from each point, break up all of the lumps and thoroughly mix the samples. Do likewise with the subsoil samples, keeping them separate from the surface soil samples.

Place 1-2 pint of this composite sample in a small cotton bag. Tie the top firmly and attach a tag giving your name and address on one side and on the reverse side address the parcel to the Dept. of Chemistry, Soils Division, O.A.C. Guelph, or to any of the stations named below which may be nearer to you than O.A.C. (e) Wet soils should be dried when preparing soil samples for mailing. To dry soil samples avoid putting them in a hot oven, rather dry the soil on a cloth or paper in direct sunlight.

3. Soil sampling instructions and Question blanks may be obtained from your agricultural representative or from any of the test stations named below. Please answer the questions for each sample on the blanks and send this information in a separate envelope at the time your soil samples go forward. One should be sure to number his samples clearly and keep a record or copy of his scheme of numbering so that the report may be given according to number. Samples may be sent to the nearest to you of any of the following stations: (1) Ont. Agricultural College, Guelph. (2) Western Ontario Experimental Farm, Ridgeway. (3) Kempsville Agricultural School, Kempsville. (4) Ontario Horticultural Experiment Station, Vineland. (5) Dominion Experimental Station, Harrow. (6) Dominion Tobacco Sub-Station, Delhi. (7) O.A.C. Tobacco Extension Service, Post Office Building, Tillsonburg.
