"Girls' Solo—Betsy Paul, 2nd place, silver medal; Marjorie Kentner, 4th place—15 entries.

The Georgetown Choral Society entered the Peel Musical Festival in Port Credit, on Friday evening, and were awarded the Mrs. Chas. Gilbert Trophy. ALCOHOL AND ACCIDENTS

Most accidents of whatever nature, may be prevented if due care on the part of some one responsible had been exercised. Various reasons, or more often excuses, are given why such care was not forthcoming at the proper time.

In automobile accidents various causes enter into the picture. The driver may be too young, and as such is not expected to exercise the judgment and reason necessary to operate a high-powered machine and especially on a crowded or treacherous highway, hence the Department of Highways sets an age limit for anyone who may lawfully drive.

Yet this same government of which the highway department is but a branch, sees fit to legalize the sale of alcoholic beverages to anyone who is old enough. True the department does not want anyone to use the beverage to such an extent as to upset judgment and reason, but once it gets into the driver's blood circulation, the department of highway is out of control and the narcotic for such is alcohol comes into the picture. The natural control of the highly organized nerve mechanism is temporarily interfered with or inhibited, with the result that thoughts, words and actions are not as prompt as they are promptly, less efficiently, and if the proper chain of circumstances obtains, an accident is the result. The question arises, who is to blame? Certainly not the driver only. The Bible says that he who causes a brother to stumble is his blame.

In any of our district courts, after the presiding judge has heard the evidence for or against, he instructs the jury that they are in duty bound to carefully weigh the evidence, and after having done so, are to solemnly decide, ON THE EVIDENCE, whether or not the accused is guilty of any crime, or misdemeanor.

There is ample evidence to the fact, that the use of alcoholic beverages whether in a lesser or greater quantity, and because of the narcotic property, does and will produce a varied degree of narcosis in the user, and does and will interfere with his or her judgment, in the performance of any act or duty requiring a maximum of alertness, whether it be behind the controls in an automobile or an aeroplane, in the operating room where a precious life is at stake or in any one of the numerous industrial activities requiring a keen sense of rightness or accuracy of judgment.

We cannot, therefore, as communities, or as individuals neglect our part in securing legislation which shall protect humanly and supply in the place more and better food for our boys and girls or our working men and women, in place of a popular alcoholic beverage whose food value is so little, if any.
