More than two thousand men , of numerous classifications of employment will be required for the operaduring its progress over the lines of the Canadian National Railways, according to a statement made today by N. B. Walton, vice-president in charge of operation for the National System. When Paul was driven out of the nectson with signals, crossings, and the synagogue he did not cease witnessing. He merely transferred his activities to a private house. > A Time Exposure, 9 - 11 Sudden conversions are real. Paul saw many of them. Steady and slow growth is necessary, however, even for those who have had the dramatic experience of a sudden conversion. It is by seeing what Christ can do for men and women through a period of discipleship, continuing over several years, that we have the fullest demonstration of his power. Paul stayed for a year and a half in Corinth. building his converts up in the Christian faith. When he left Corinth, there remained a group of people who were able to carry on his work. Demonstration, 1. - 5 Even greater than Paul's thinking was the influence of his daily life. The Corinthians saw a great scholar giving fellowship freely. They saw a Jew mingling without reservation amongst Greeks. They felt the power of the Holy Spirit in the life of this man who lived in their homes. What i is the explanation of the influence of Paul? He himself did not attribute it to personal appearance, eloquence, or popularity. He gave all the credit to the crucified Christ. The Cross had tranformed the disposition of Paul The one-time persecutor had become an expert in Christian love. Paul didd not preach self-help, but God's help in Christ. Christ finds an open door into a human heart when some individual recognises that genuine Christians have an inner power radiating truth, love and good will.


