Here's a town in which if a man will not work neither shall he drink. In St. Marys all citizens receiving relief will have their names put on the Indian list and will under no conditions be allowed to buy liquor. The town council has decided. The move is being made to keep certain ones from frequenting local taverns and from spending town money on spirits, councillors said as they passed the ruling.
—The Presbyterian Record in an editorial protesting against Sunday radio advertising by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, quotes the following from The Lord's Day Act: "It shall not be lawful for any person to advertise in any manner whatsoever any performance or other thing prohibited by this act." It seems clear that this regulation applies to radio, coming within the meaning of that clause "in any manner whatsoever" and yet the advertising business is the persistent feature of Sunday broadcasting," continues the editorial.
