EVELYNE HARTLEY

A bright young life was terminated on Sunday last when Evelyn, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. Hartley of Virden, Man., passed away at Brampton Hospital. Deceased had resided in Georgetown for the past two years. She was born at Ruislip, near Virden, Man., educated in Virden Collegiate and studied music in Brandon College. She was organist in St. Paul's United Church for four years, and was also organist for the Augmented Choir singing the Messiah. Miss Hartley came East and studied dressmaking. She leaves her mother and father, three sisters, Constance, Beatrice and Joyce. Miss Hartley's death is deeply regretted by her many friends in Georgetown. The remains were taken to Virden, Man., for interment.

JOHN McDERMID

After an illness of some months, John McDermid, dearly beloved husband of Janet I. Cobban, passed away at his home on Marke St. on Tuesday morning, May 2nd. Deceased was the son of the late John and Ellen McDermid and was born in Georgetown in 1874. He attended the public and high schools here, and when a young man was employed in his father's grocery store. At the death of his father he took charge of the business which he conducted successfully for some years. He was appointed Postmaster in 1912, which position he held at the time of his death. He was married June 17, 1903, to Janet I. Cobban of Acton and has been a resident of Georgetown all his life. Besides his wife he is survived by one daughter, Isabel, at home, and one son, Rev. John A. McDermid of Mt. Forest. One brother, Duncan, of Grand View, Man., and one sister, Mrs. Margaret Howson of Winnipegosis, Man., also survive. Deceased was a member of Knox Presbyterian Church until Union took place, since when he has been a member of the United Church. He was treasurer of Knox Church for many years and also treasurer of the United Church until, owing to ill health, he resigned a short time ago. He was a member of the Public Library Board, of which he was secretary for some years. He was a Mason and member of Credit Lodge A.P. & A.M. As Postmaster he was always courteous and obliging and filled that position with credit to himself and to the department he represented. In the passing of John McDermid the home has lost a kind and loving father, and the town one of its best and most highly esteemed citizens. The funeral on Thursday afternoon was largely attended, when the service at the home was conducted by Rev. F. C. Overend, assisted by Rev. E. G. Baxter. The pallbearers were Messrs. C. J. Mathews, Acton; E. W. Cole, Wm. Deans, James Richardson, R. C. Adams, A. E. Parnell. Members of Credit Lodge A.P. & A.M. attended in a body and took part in the service at the grave which was conducted by Worshipful Master Jos. Sanford, W. Bro. Hugh Dickie and W. Bro. Geo. Dobson. There were many beautiful floral tributes from relatives and friends. Friends from Seaforth, Toronto, Elmwood, Brampton, Acton and surrounding district were present at the funeral.

At May Meeting

HIGH SCHOOL RUNNER BREAKS RECORD AT WATERLOO TRACK MEET

Four girls from the Georgetown High School entered five events in the Waterloo College track and field meet last Saturday. Jean Ruddell and Mary Cummins entered the 100 yard dash; Marg Hoare ran in the 220 yards dash; Jean Bernie entered the standing broad jump; Mary Cummins entered the running broad jump, and the four girls made up a relay team for the 440 yard relay. Marg Hoare ran a smooth race to finish in second place in the final of the 220 yd. dash, and Mary Cummins took second place in the running broad jump with a jump of 13 feet 4 1/2 in., only one inch behind the winner of first place. Mary Cummins ran second in her heat in the 100 yd. dash, but unfortunately this position did not qualify her to enter the final. In the relay our team had the misfortune to be placed in a heat with a crack team from Elmira, and running second in this heat they could not enter the final.

On the whole the girls made quite a creditable showing. The two point winners—Marg Hoare and Mary Cummins—attended the banquet given for all the participants and there received their ribbons.

Edward Stigger, the intermediate champion of the school, and James Coffel, the junior champion, were entered in those events in which they specialize. Both made an excellent showing in view of the fact that 29 schools were competing and 284 entries.

In this competition which was naturally very keen, Edward Stigger won first and the cup for the mile run—breaking the former record established in 1937, by 6 seconds. His time of 5 minutes, 7 2/5 seconds, was one of the outstanding achievements of the day. In the 880 yards, Ted Stigger placed 4th against senior competition and is rapidly establishing a reputation for smooth, speedy and clever running. With steady training Stigger hopes to win in the forthcoming St. Catharines meet.

James Coffel had very stiff competition in the 100 yards race, but he managed to place second in his heat. In the pole vault he gained a height of 9 feet. Considering that Jim is a junior and that he was competing against seniors he made a creditable effort.

Moved by Murray and May, that the Treasurer pay relief accounts as presented by the Relief Officer, \$400.49.—Carried.

Moved by Harrop and Wilson, that the Treasurer be given authority to accept the reduced rate of interest on Province of Alberta bond due April 1st, 1939, for \$22.50, on account of Railway Bonus Fund. 60% of the face value, viz: \$11.25.—Carried.

Moved by May and Murray, that the Treasurer pay: Whillier and Company, supplies \$10.51; Bell Telephone Co., 281-24, \$2.83, 91-12 \$1.40, total \$4.03; J. E. Whitlock, secretary Halton Plowmen's Association \$10.00; Mrs. E. C. Hodge, to cleaning Council chamber \$3.60; Blight and White, to advertising re dog tax \$7.56.—Carried.

Mr. L. Skuce, Public School Inspector addressed the Council with reference to township school areas, leaving a very favourable impression with the Councillors.

Mr. T. G. Ramshaw, Mr. C. K. Charles and G. C. Brown, addressed the Council regarding township road insurance.
