Hoare ran in the 220 yards dash; Jean Bennie entered the standing broad jump; Mary Cummins entered the running broad jump, and the four girls made up a relay team for the 440 yard relay.

Marg. Hoare ran a smooth race to finish in second place in the final of the 220 yd. dash, and Mary Cummins took second place in the running broad jump with a jump of 13 feet 41: in., only one inch behind the winner of first place. Mary Cummins ran second in her heat in the 100 yd. dash, but unfortunately this position did not qualify her to enter the finals. A Sewage System ?
