ALCOHOL AND EFFICIENCY

Present day requirements are for efficiency, whether it be in the business world, the professional field, or in the more narrowed life about the home. Employers of labor usually, if not always, require that no alcoholic beverages be consumed while at work, and if they speak what is uppermost in their minds, the employers would prefer total abstainers.
That alcoholic beverages reduce efficiency was ably demonstrated in an experiment on four cocker spaniels, by Prof. C. F. Hodge at Clark University, Worcester, Mass. Two of these pups were given small amounts of alcohol daily with their food for a given time and the other two were given their normal food without added alcohol. Both pairs apparently developed alike, but when all were simultaneously put to a test, for example, returning balls thrown to a distance, those two pups not fed alcohol, returned nearly twice as many balls as the two that were given the alcohol. The latter would start alright, but would be down on their task, and permit the other two to get the balls. Furthermore, it was noted that the two pups who did not receive any alcohol in their food were much more courageous than the others when frightening sounds were used as a test. The former stood their ground and the latter fled. Again, when full grown it was further noted that the offspring from the abstainers had over five times the vitality of that of the two tipplers. These facts speak for themselves.
