Miss E. May McMaster, youngest daughter of the late Samuel and Sarah A. McMaster, passed away at her home Glen Williams, Ontario, on Sunday, May 14th, 1939. The late Miss McMaster, much loved by all with whom she came in contact for her bright, unselfish disposition, was well-known in musical and church associations, having been organist for many years. Left to mourn her loss are two sisters, Mrs. R. Vance Braddon, Mrs. Mrs. Rennie Melita Man, and three brothers, Samuel and Thomas of Glen Williams, and Joseph of Windsor.
