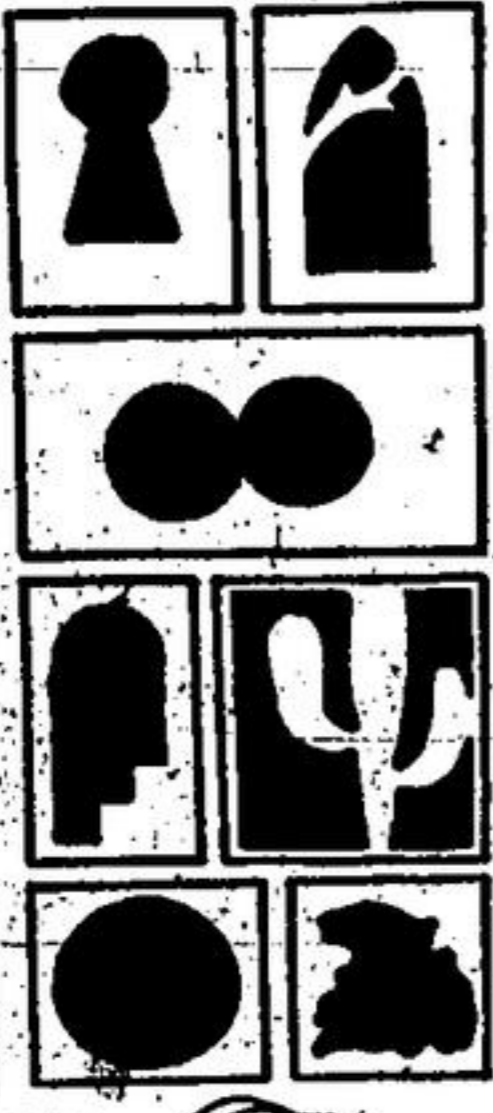
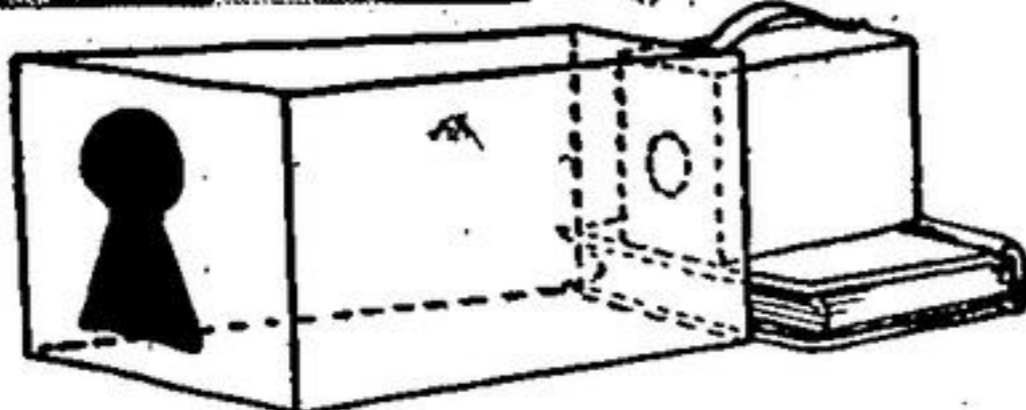

TRICK PICTURES



Simple "mask box" makes it easy to take pictures with trick "frames." Above, "keyhole" picture. Right, box showing placing of camera and cut-out mask.

SNAPSHOTS with trick "frames" are easy to take, and fun to show. You can get pictures apparently made through keyholes or field glasses—and many other novel effects.

Obtain an ordinary cardboard box. It should be about twelve inches one way, and eight inches or more the other two dimensions. Exact size doesn't matter. Cut a hole in the middle of one end, a bit larger than your camera lens. Cut a large opening in the opposite end, and over this place a large "keyhole" cut out of cardboard (see drawing above). It is a good idea to paint the inside of the box black, to guard against stray reflections.

Now, place the box on a firm support, such as a table. Sight through

the small rear opening, and adjust box until it frames the scene you want to picture. Line up the camera with the rear opening, as shown—and take the picture. Use a small lens opening, making a "time" exposure if the light requires it.

For other effects, just use a different cutout, such as those shown above. Make cut-outs with simple outlines. When you use a mask box twelve inches long, a cut-out opening about six inches high or wide is usually satisfactory. After your first roll of pictures, you can tell if larger or smaller masks are preferable.

Since the cut-out masks are close to the lens, they will be somewhat out-of-focus and "fuzzy." This helps conceal the faking, and adds to the effect.

RURAL GIRLS' CONFERENCE PROVES GREAT SUCCESS

450 Farm Girls in Residence at O.A.C. for three days discuss all aspects of family life including Food, Clothing, Social and use of Leisure.

What contributions can farm girls make to the home and family living? This, broadly, was the theme of the Rural Girls' Conference held at the O.A.C., Guelph, last week and attended by 450 girls from all over the province. The well-arranged program was sponsored by the Women's Institute Branch, Ont. Dept. of Agriculture, and the staff of Macdonald Institute, Guelph.

One of the features was the contribution of the girls themselves to the program, including a demonstration of a typical Homemaking Club meeting. Macdonald students put on a panel discussion "What we eat, we are" and an instructive and entertaining skit, "A Comedy of Errors in Eating." Macdonald exhibited a model of a typical "Accidents in the Home," "Cakes and Cake Failures" and "Hot School Lunches." The girls were also interested in a revue "Wardrobe Suggestions."

The program took up in detail such subjects as a girl's relation to her family; her responsibilities to her family; towards herself as a member of the family and what she can expect from her family. There were talks on food, clothing, social relationships, use of leisure and reading for the family. This latter subject was treated in a most interesting way by Miss Ethel Chapman of the Farmer's Magazine. W. R. Reek, Deputy Minister of Agriculture for Ontario, was the principal speaker at the banquet which closed the conference.

FROM "ROBINSON CRUSOE" ISLAND

Strawberries and Lobsters Flourish There—"Ma Friday" was a Carib Indian

When Alexander Selkirk, sailor on whose experiences Daniel Defoe based Robinson Crusoe, was put ashore on Juan Fernandez Island, his facilities for survival were limited. He had only a few tools and a few provisions. He was isolated there for four lonely years passed before he was taken off again.

But pity for his plight might turn to envy if the world knew more of the island's native foods. Lobsters are shipped regularly to Argentine tables, and now a California expedition plans to stop by Juan Fernandez to pick strawberries. The island berries have a hardness in resisting disease which may improve United States strawberries if the two strains were crossed.

The famous lobsters are rushed alive from Juan Fernandez by boat to Chile 365 miles away, and from there are lifted by plane over the Andes, at an altitude of three and one-half miles to Buenos Aires for dinner.

This island where Selkirk lived, and had the experience which gave Defoe the idea for Robinson Crusoe, should not be confused however, with Tobago, in the West Indies, the island Defoe had in mind as the setting for his novel, "Friday." It will be recalled, was a Carib Indian, and the fiction of Robinson Crusoe was shipwrecked near the mouth of the Orinoco River.

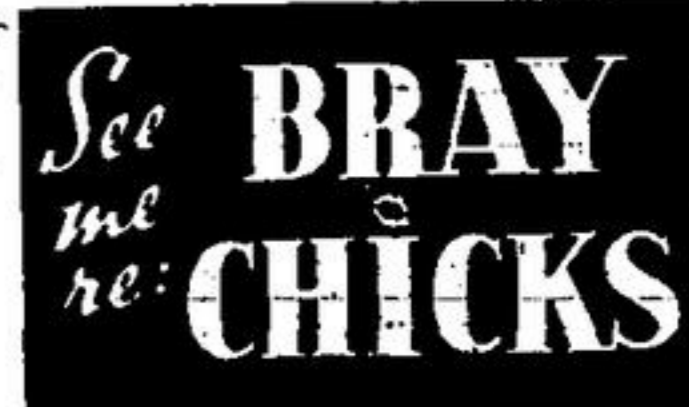
The June meeting will be held at the home of the president, Mrs. Vannatter, Thursday, June 8th, when Miss Sybil Bennett will address the gathering.

SAYS CRIME TRIALS STRESS NEED FOR MORE INTEREST IN SCHOOLS

L. L. Skuce, Halton Public School Inspector, utilized a newspaper in his address to the annual Milton Home and School Club last Thursday to emphasize the necessity for fuller co-operation between parents and teachers. Indicating criminal trials in progress and reading "lurid" headlines depicting crime and strife, he challenged: "Isn't it time we were taking an interest in schools?"

He stated that support of Home and School Clubs in Halton is at a minimum in some areas and asked, "Does it mean that people today are not interested in their children?"

He strongly advised that parents "get the teacher's viewpoint—it is very helpful and well advised." He stated that there is a better spirit in both the school and the community when Home and School clubs are present.
