Fair Boards Given Grants by County Council

Halton county council met in Milton on Tuesday, May 29th, with the warden and all members present except Mr. Byers. Following the reading of the minutes and correspondence by the clerk, council received delegates from the various local fair boards in the county, who requested a grant be given them as in former years. A discussion followed in regard to the advisability of one central fair for a continuation of the present separate local fair system.

Mr. W. Wilson, when asked to express his views, declined to give an opinion. Mr. Kerns, however, quite frankly gave it as his opinion that one central fair—a county fair—would be far more satisfactory than several smaller fairs.

At the afternoon session, Mr. J. J. Stewart and Mr. Ramshaw from Acton were present also to request a fall fair grant.

Warden: "Perhaps you gentlemen might like to know there was some discussion this morning as to the advisability of just having one real fair. What do you think?"

Mr. Ramshaw: "Well, there's only one real fair now. (Laughter). No, I don't think it would work. One fair for the whole county would never please everyone. We want to carry on, and if the county council will give us a grant usual to what is given the other fair boards, we shall be satisfied."

A grant of \$175 was given to each of the fall fairs, Milton, Georgetown and Acton.

Mr. Geo. Thorpe and Mr. J. A. Lindley, from Nelson, appealed to the council to support a protest to the department of highways in regard to the closing of Maple avenue, near Burlington. These gentlemen asserted that closing this road was a great inconvenience to fruitgrowers in that district and was also a hazard to the public, as it meant drivers had to make a left turn at one point and cross both the east and west traffic on the highway. Council decided the matter should be left over until such time as they could make further inquiries.

The county roads committee recommended that the salary of the engineer be increased \$300. Contracts were also awarded for bituminous material for road work.

A letter from the department of highways advised council that clerical assistance should be given the county engineer. This was left over in absence pending further inquiries by the council from the department. Clerical assistance was already being given the engineer by the county clerk, but, according to the communication from the department, it was usually advisable for the engineer to have his own clerk.

The railways, legislation and agriculture committee recommended the usual grant of \$62.50 be made to the Junior Farmers of Halton, also a grant of \$62.50 to the Junior Homemakers of Halton.

Moved by Mr. Robinson, seconded by Mr. Gordon, that leave be granted to introduce a by-law to amend by-law No. 675, to increase the salary of the county engineer by \$300.—Carried.
