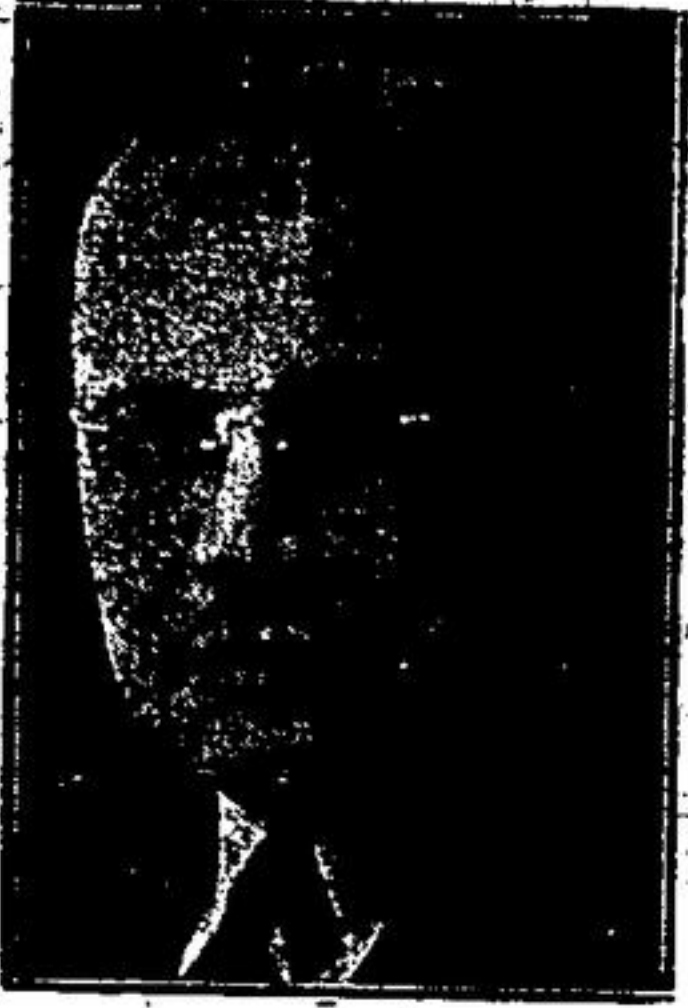

ANNUAL APPLE IMPORT

Canada imports annually a small quantity of apples, the bulk of which arrive during the summer months when domestic supplies are not available. The United States has been the largest supplier, although shipments from the Antipodes have shown a steady increase in recent years. Out of the 287,745 bushels of apples imported into Canada in 1938, the United States supplied 172,289 bushels; New Zealand, 115,410 bushels, and other countries, 36 bushels.

1935 Winners at Waterloo Musical Festival



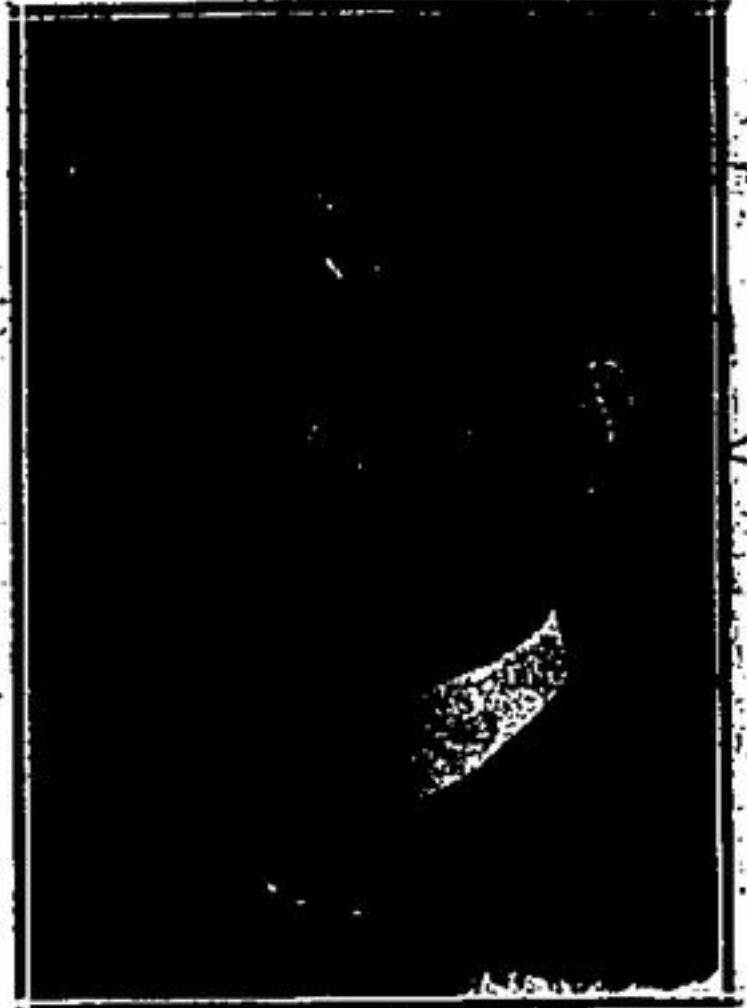

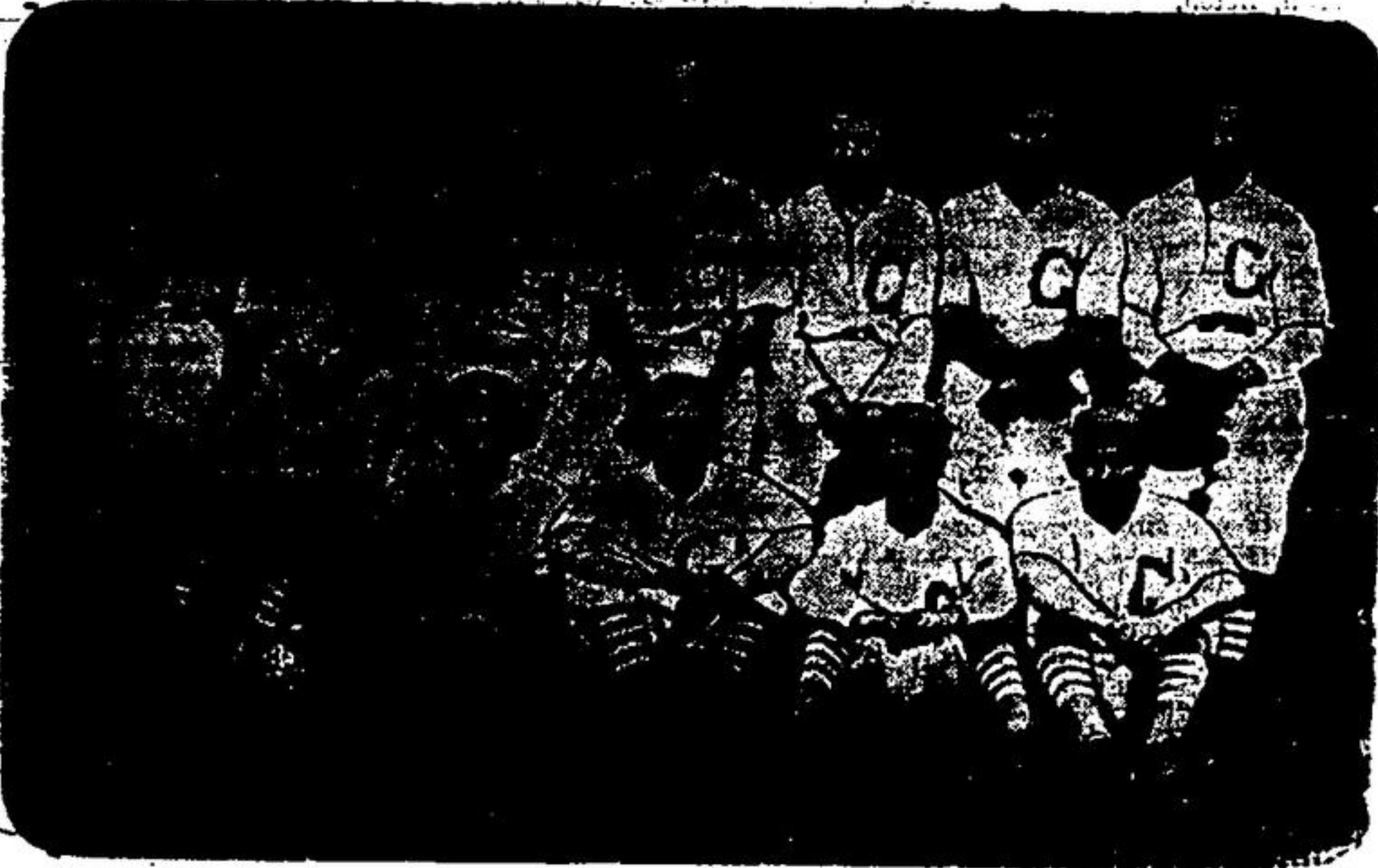

BAPTISTS TO RAISE \$100,000 FOR DEBTS

The Ontario-Quebec Golden Jubilee convention of the Baptist Church adopted a proposal to raise a special \$100,000 fund during the next two years to take care of depression debts and deficits and enable convention boards to keep their work at its present standard without making further retrenchments. Responsibility for raising the fund was divided between the various boards as follows: Foreign missions, \$27,000; home missions, \$27,000; publication board, \$18,000; superannuation board, \$10,000; western missions, \$8,000; Grande Ligne, \$8,000.
