ARTS AND THEOLOGY STUDENTS GO TO MISSION FIELDS

Two hundred arts and theology students of The United Church of Canada colleges were this week appointed to mission fields of Canada.

Some students were placed in every province of Canada. Three students were stationed in Newfoundland. Two of these will engage in missionary work in lumber camps.

The largest number of students went to Northern Saskatchewan. One student was given mission work in the Caribou. The mining areas of Northern Ontario also received a number of students.

The young men will serve on the mission fields for twenty weeks. For at least a quarter of them it will be the first experience in missionary work.

The students have been placed in areas where there is no regular minister.

These students will serve in the neighborhood of 800 preaching stations, many of which would have no representative of the church ministering to them if it were not for the service rendered by the students," said Rev. Dr. R. B. Ochrane, secretary of the Board of Home Missions, under whose supervision the students were placed.

These young men are laying foundations of the church of the future. Their energy, enthusiasm and spirit has already made a fine impression wherever they have been sent. They are making a fine contribution to the life of our pioneer areas. Many of the charges now dependent for support will one day be splendid, self-supporting churches.
