NEWS FROM OTTAWA DURING THE WEEK (Continued from Page 1)

turned to Ottawa from a trip to the Prairie provinces, told reporters that "the heating that the crop has taken recently from the lack of rain is not generally realized." In Western Ontario, fruit and grain crops have also suffered quite severely although peaches and plums are still plentiful. Good rainfalls would mean literally millions to orchard owners and tobacco growers. And of course dry weather means greater hazard of fires in forest areas. In Northern Ontario Forestry aeroplanes have been keeping constant watch throughout daylight hours.

This week or next Mr. Duplessis, premier of Quebec, will come to Ottawa with the mayors of several large cities in Quebec, to discuss with the Dominion government the question of the best method of dealing with pressing unemployment problems. Mr. Duplessis asked for the interview by a telegram to Mr. King. Unfortunately Mr. King, himself, is spending much of this week in Toronto at the Liberal convention so that, as he replied to Mr. Duplessis, some members of his cabinet could meet the delegation this week but it would be only next week that the Dominion prime minister could attend a conference at Ottawa. The main question to be discussed will be how to harmonize Provincial and Dominion views on relative amounts to be spent on direct relief and on public works.

Differences of opinion in regard to the administration of aid to municipalities also remain to be settled with the Ontario government. The Ontario government has asked that the Dominion's share in the cost of approved municipal projects should take the form of direct grants of fixed sums in advance of work being carried out. The Dominion government does not agree to this. The explanation of Mr. Rogers, federal minister of labor, is that the principle of a 50 per cent contribution by the labor costs of approved municipal improvements is being carried out under agreements with other provinces, and there can be no discrimination in favour of any one particular province. The Dominion's fifty per cent of labor costs, Mr. Rogers says, is available. An Ontario municipality up to the total of 2 1/2 million dollars allocated for this purpose to the government of Ontario.
