Thomas Darling was born in Georgetown and resided here for sometime during his boyhood days, before going with his parents to Guelph.

He was first of many Guelph youths to join the Royal Air Porce, and was at the time of his death, manning a gaint bombing plane in the recent airraid precautions and blackouts in England. The plane is believed to have gone out of control and dived into the North Sea. Five other men also went down with Darling.

Monday was Darling's birthday. Through the mail came a letter to his parents, written before the crash, expressing anticipation at his planned home-coming later this summer. The sympathy of friends here is ex-

Mrs. Kennedy told me that he also drew several amusing sketches of some of the other teachers, including

Miss Wright, Miss Lindsay and herelf. He resigned in the middle of the fall term of 1897, with what amounted to a nervous breakdown. had spent a year studying under him and I am deeply grateful for the privilege. After he had recovered suffi-

ciently, he went back to teaching for a short time, at Stamford Collegiate at Niagara Falls, before finally going into medicine. As part of a trip last year Mrs. Kennedy came east through the Canadian West from Vancouver, and met and talked with quite a number of the former pupils of G.H.S., and was able to give me some splendid infor-

mation about people that I knew.

When Miss Hutt left G.H.S. in 1900,

she received from the train pupils from up north a group photograph which included the following: Fred Lake, Joe Turner, Bessie Mountain, Dunc. Sinclair, Harry Bracken, Joe Clark, Johnson Kidd, Ethel Wilson, Jimmle O'Neill, Aggie Wooding, and a Miss Allen. Aggle Wooding came from Mansewood, but was a great friend of Ethel Wilson's. I know no more loval group, than were the pupils who came by train from the
