Connecting Link Pavement at Georgetown to Cost \$6,816.18

County Council Sign Agreement with Town-Reeve N. A. Robinson of Esquesing Protests Against Rail Grading

Following a meeting of the county roads committee in the morning, Halton county council met in Milton last Tuesday at 2 p.m.

The following resolution from Perth county was endorsed by the council but only after considerable discussion. This resolution referred to a press report that the Provincial government proposes reducing the number of members of the legislative assembly as an

economy measure. "Whereas the county of Perth considers economy might be better effected from the eleven hundred govern- a.m. ment officials who receive from \$2,000 to \$7,500 per year, rather than from among the ninety members elected by the people. Therefore, be it resolved that this county council request the Provincial government to leave undisturbed the present number of members of the legislature and such other

means of effecting desired economies." Mr. Byers: "The provincial government could quite well cut down on the number of inspectors they send through the country.

Mr. Hewson: "I agree. Each small nunicipality does its best to economise. But what is the legislature doing? Nothing but wasting money by sending inspectors for this, that and the other all over the country."

Warden: "I think Dominion provincial expenditures could certainly be cut down, but I think it would be a mistake to entertain any idea of dispensing with any of the deputy

Mr. Robinson started a discussion relative to the merits or demerits of the new system or rail-grading of hogs. Mr. Robinson stated there were Accredited Jersey Herd practically only two abattoirs in Toronto which absolutely control-t-heprice. When the rail grading came into force there was a 50c drop in one week. Not five farmers in 100 are in favor of it, then why should it be forced on the farmers by the abattoirs and then take just what they like to give them? And it is only the beginning, he stated. Before long you would find sheep, calves and

lambs being rail-graded too. Warden: "Personally, I am in favor or rail-grading, but I agree it should not be forced on the farmers. The only thing to do is to introduce a co-operative system. I think the stock yard commission men could be

reduced by 50 per cent." Mr. Hewson: "I think Poland has the finest marketing system in the world. In that country they bonus their farmers for good produce."

Mr. Irving surprised the council with the information that Milton has a forgotten street. The street in quesion is that running past the county

Mr. Irving had looked up a survey map of 1854 and also one of 1867, but in neither was this road or street mentioned. Neither was there any record of any by-law having been passed giving the town of Milton possession of this roadway.

Mr. Irving brought this matter to the attention of the council for the purpose of obtaining some financial assistance from the county for the construction of this road, upon which the town, of Milton has recently done Aug. considerable work.

Mr. Robinson: "If anything is paid; by the county it will have to be from the general funds and not from the

road allowances." Council were agreed that some assistance might be given for the upkeep of this road.

The report of the road committee dealt mainly with the road to be constructed in Georgetown, being a connecting link in the county road system. The total cost of the road would be \$6,816.18. Of this \$4,093.35 would be paid by the county and \$2,722.83 by the town of Georgetown. The committee also recommended that the warden and clerk be authorized sign the necessary agreement with Georgetown and that the same be submitted to the department of highways for their approval.

It was further recommended that a delegation be sent to the good roads convention to be held at Quebec city. Setp. 12th, 13th and 14th.-Carried.

The chairman of the county buildings committee recommended payment of accounts and suggested that the time had come when it is absolutely necessary for a new filing system to be installed in the registry office. The system recommended by the committee would cost approximately \$800 and would last from ten

to fifteen years. Mr. Gordon reported that while the reforestation committee had not been very active in the past, they were now in the position to inform council that there was a very good piece of land in Nassagaweya which the owner was willing to sell and which Mr. Gordon felt would do splendidly for reforestation purposes, especially as there was already a stand of young timber growing on the place. Mr. Irving also recommended purchase this land, which he said was well fenced, and 25 acres could be out with new trees. It was agreed that council should meet early at their next meeting inspect this land during the noon hour.

On motion of Mr. Gilbert and Mr. Robinson, the county treesurer was instructed to pay C. W. Conover and Joseph Hill the sum of \$25 each, as a reward for the apprehension and conviction of Alfred Rogers for stealing chickens.

The following accounts were passed for payment: Pinance, \$512.69; hospitals, \$1,025.60; county buildings, \$65.16. printing, \$29.05; agriculture, \$50.00. A by-law was passed to authorise the execution of an agreement between Halton county and the town of Georgetown, re construction of
