President of Bell Telephone Company Sends Message to. Employees

The following letter was sent to employees of the Bell Telephone Co. by the President, C. F. Siee, in consideration of the present war between Canada and Germany:--

"Canada, along with Britain and the sister nations of the Empire, is again at war. The cause in which now she called upon to consecrate all her resources is nothing less than the preservation of human liberty, the re-establishment of good faith amonest the mations of the world.

"It was only after the break-down of long-continued efforts to preserve the peace that Britain embarked her present course. Prime Minister Chamberlain said in proclaiming state of war with Germany-

"We have done all that any country could do to establish peace. But a situation in which no word given by Germany's ruler could be trusted and no people or country could feel itself safe, has become intolerable. And now we have resolved to finish

"Obviously the determination pressed in the Premier's statement implies the whole-souled devotion of all the people of the British Commonwealth. Everyone has a part to play. "The service which we as a Com-

pany render the community never of more importance to country's welfare than it is in grave crisis. Already we have pledged ourselves as a Company to do everything within our power to aid the Government. We have outlined General Circular No. 100 the extent to which we are prepared to aid those associating themselves with the Militia and the Active Services Forces:-

Despite the fact that the Federal Government purchased in June last four million pounds of butter for free distribution to needy families in an effort to relieve the glut of butter in storage and help the dairy industry, there is said to be fifty-five million pounds of butter in storage bought at the depressed prices. Since the declaration of war, butter has gone up five cents a pound to the consumer, which represents a wartime profit on the butter in storage of about \$2,700,000. once cent of which goes to aid of


