

"The corporation income tax rate is

20 per cent. "All individuals subject to income tax will be required in future to pay a war surtax equal to 20 per cent of their ordinary income tax.

"We are now recommending that the present rates of \$4 and \$5 per gallon, respectively, on domestic and imported liquors should be increased to \$7 and \$8 per gallon respectively.

"The other new changes being made in our tax structure should produce a revenue of approximately \$62,000,000. "We are engaged in a grim and serious business. Modern war is a conflict in which whole nations are pitted against one another. The issue may be decided not by the relative strength of armed forces but by the magnitude and efficient use of economic power and by the test of human nerves, the strength of the will of peoples to bear burdens and stand strains. No one can doubt the courage and the moral strength of the Canadian people. But this courage and strength must be shown at home as well as on the fleid of battle. Our war effort on the economic side must extend throughout the country from the city factory to the farthest frontier farm and mine. Our people will, we are confident, bear their burdens with fortitude, and pursue their respective tasks with a determination to let nothing interfere with maximum efficiency.
