Horse Breeding is on Increase

Report of Stallion Enrollment Board shows 1791 stallions in Ontario compared with 1883 last year—Free inspection of stallions commences Oct. 3 in five districts.

Horse breeding is on the increase in Ontario, according to the report of the Stallion Enrollment Board, just released by Secretary L. K. O'Neill, Toronto. The report shows a total of 1791 stallions for Ontario as compared with 1883 last year.

Not since 1919, when 1,729 stallions were enrolled, has there been as many offered for service as in the past season, Mr. O'Neill states. The low point in stallion breeding of Ontario was in 1924 when only 1,022 stallions were enrolled.

According to Mr. O'Neill, stallion breeding is on the increase even in the smaller sections of the province. The report shows that in 1938, 1,791 stallions were enrolled in Ontario, as compared with 1,883 in 1937.

two breeds are followed in order by 186 Belgians, 111 Standard Breds, 33 Thoroughbreds, 18 French Canadians, seven French Coaches, six German Coaches, six Suffolk Punch and two miscellaneous.

A survey of the leading counties is also interesting. Middlesex is first, with 80 stallions enrolled, followed by Perth and Huron, each with 75; Bruce, 72; Simcoe, 71; Wellington and Grey, each 65, York 62.

Free inspection of Stallions commences Oct. 3, the province having been divided into five districts for this purpose, Mr. O'Neill states. Anyone wanting stallion inspection for enrollment in 1939 should make application at once to the county agricultural representative. If not done at this time, the cost will be \$10. for a later inspection.

REGRASSING EXPERIMENTS

Regrassing as one aspect of reclamation work under the Prairie Farm Rehabilitation Act, has for its objective the establishment or improvement of grass cover on areas of farm land which are unsuitable for ordinary crop production. Many regrassing experiments are in progress throughout Western Saskatchewan and Southern Alberta.

During the past three years an extensive series of experiments have been laid down throughout west central Saskatchewan and east central Alberta. These experiments which consist largely of direct, raised, and methods of seeding crested wheat grass and in some cases in comparison with bronze grass, have made excellent progress during the current season. One outstanding result is that late fall seeding of crested wheat grass is superior to early spring seeding and that both methods are better than seeding at other times. It has been observed that crested wheat grass can be established in, and eventually displace, heavy stands of Russian thistle. At six points in the special areas of Alberta, the regrassing experiments cover a total of 2,400 acres.
