Wellington County Historical Research Society Eleventh Annual Meeting

MISS E. APPELBE, GEORGETOWN, GAVE ADDRESS ON HISTORICAL RESEARCH

There must be something vital in this research work, when several hundred persons in the county gathered annually in a busy season to note the progress of their Society.

The meeting was held in the Memorial Hall of the O.A.C. Guelph, with the morning session devoted to business. In her report of Centre Wellington, Miss Ada Currie stated that during the year their efforts had been directed towards gathering village histories. Reporting also for the Museum committee Miss Currie mentioned the gift of two very old maps of the county and of a cutter nearly one hundred years old, made by a Mr. Smith of Hillsburg.

Colonel Pritchard, veteran, and convener of the military committee, stressed the necessity of keeping records of present military activities in the county and closed his report with General Haig's message to the soldiers before one of the battles in the Great War: "Our backs are to the wall. We are fighting for our lives and the British Empire."

Responding to a warm welcome, Miss Appelbe of Georgetown stated that her address would just be a talk about the value of "Odds and Ends" of research and used as an illustration the copy of a letter written from "Dowing Street," London, England, October 25, 1827, to John Galt, secretary of the Canada Company at Guelph.

Mrs. Anne Anderson Perry, owner and editor of the Elora Express, gave a very fine and shall we say, prophetic address. Mrs. Perry said, "We face an unknown world; extraordinary changes have confused and complicated our lives. We need courage to face the realities of life instead of side-stepping them. If the principles of democracy are to survive we must have men and women of character; people who have learned to do their own thinking. The world is in revolution. We have a wonderful opportunity. In America we may have a chance to evolve a new culture of living."

PAVING BY-LAWS GIVEN SECOND AND THIRD READINGS

Moved by Davis, seconded by Hall, that N. Snyder be granted the privilege of obtaining scrap from the town dump for \$25.00 per week to be under the supervision of Chief Marshall.—Carried.

Moved by Lyons, seconded by Hall, that by-law No. — to authorize the Head and Treasurer of the Town to borrow the sum of \$18,431.38 to cover the cost of laying pavements on Main, Edith and other streets until the debentures are sold be now read a second and third times and finally passed, and the seal of the Corporation be attached thereto.—Carried.

Moved by Lyons, seconded by Davis, that by-law No. — to authorize the issue of debentures to pay for the Municipality's share of the re-surfacing of the connecting links from the town limits at the Golf Links on Maple Ave. to the intersection of Church and Main Streets be now read a first time.—Carried.

Moved by Hall, seconded by McDonald, that by-law No. — to provide for the issue of debentures to pay for the Municipality's share of the improved surfacing of the connecting link from the town limits at the Golf Links on Maple Avenue to the intersection of Church and Main Streets be now read a second and third times and finally passed and the seal of the Corporation be attached thereto.—Carried.

Moved by McDonald, seconded by Lyons, that by-law No. — to amend by-law No. 3611 of the Town of Georgetown and to provide for angle parking on Main Street be now read a first time.—Carried.

Moved by Davis, seconded by Hall, that by-law No. — to amend by-law No. 3611 of the Town of Georgetown and to provide for angle parking on Main Street be now read a second and third times and finally passed and the seal of the Corporation be attached thereto.—Carried.

AIR PILOTS' "ROBOT"

Unique Wind Indicator for Dublin's New Airport

Dublin's new £400,000 airport at Collinstown is being fitted with a novel type of landing direction indicator which cleverly disregards sudden gusts of wind but clearly tells pilots the average wind direction.

Designed and made by a British firm (Messrs. Chance Bros. Ltd.) the "robot" indicator will be the first of its type in any aerodrome in the world. The position of its main vanes alters automatically in a definite change of wind direction takes place, and is maintained for a given period of seconds.

It is capable of remote control and remote indication. The officer in the control tower can "see" which way the wind is blowing by merely glancing at a receiver on his desk, and, if necessary, watch over the controls from "automatic" to "manual."

In the manual position the indicator can be rotated into any position and kept there. On switching back to automatic the indicator will immediately take up correct position according to the average wind direction. Other equipment for guidance of aircraft includes a mile-long line of contact lights, let into the ground, to assist aircraft to land in foggy weather.

The new airport will not be completed before next spring, but it is expected that limited use will be made of it this winter. There are 300 acres of landing area, but 700 acres have been acquired for future extension.
