The weather on Thursday, show day proper, could not have been better for the fair. From early morning the parade of prize cattle, sheep, swine, poultry and horses were brought to the grounds and by show-time one of the best livestock exhibits this side of the Toronto exhibition was judged in three rings. There was an exceptionally large entry of horses, and the six-horse team attracted many, as did the carriage class. The other classes were also good and the parade of prize winning cattle and horses was well worth the price of admission itself.

In front of the grandstand were all trotting races, high jumping, potato races, the baby show and the sheep binding contest. In the baby show Bobby Hill, nine-month old son of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Hill of Glen Williams won first prize, with William DeVries, five-month old son of Mr. and Mrs. L. DeVries, Georgetown, and Burdge Devereaux, 15-month old son of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Devereaux, Georgetown, second and third respectively. Mr. Jas. Stringer of Terra Cottiar was the winner of the sheep-binding contest.

A complete list of prize winners in all events could not be made early for this issue, but will appear next week.

To wind up another successful fair of the Equestrian Agricultural Society, a dance was held in the arena at night, when the dancers taxed the hall to capacity—over 300 attending. The music was supplied by Russ Creighton and His Mountaineers and Wee Clara Pelly put on a sensational display of acrobatic performing during the floor show.

The continuance of this community enterprise which is again coming back to its own. The thanks of the directors goes to all who helped, both in their attendance at the fair and by donations.

Adjudicator's Report Received by Band

Following are the remarks of Charles O'Neill, adjudicator at the C. N. E. band contests in which the Lorne Scots Band of Georgetown took part. The summary of remarks of the four leading bands will no doubt prove interesting to our readers:

Lorne Scots Band
A good band with strong points. Technique and precision good. General style good. Intonation needs attention. General tone good in full playing. Not so satisfactory in lighter instrumentation. Reed tone lacks solidity. Balance and ensemble generally good. A tendency to incorrectness in lengths of notes. Some musical playing. Improve clearness in playing of short notes. Band can easily become outstanding to good performance.

Owen Sound City Band
A good band. Technique very good. Tone good. Intonation very good. Style good. Balance needs attention. Precision is very good. Generally good attention to correctness rhythmically. Some laxity in not values. Nice playing of synopation. Nuances could be better handled. Tempos were, as noted on the slow side for best effect. A good performance.

Chatham Killie Band
A good band. Strong in several points, technique good. Precision very good. Tone good. Intonation good. Balance and ensemble generally good. Good general style. Good general correctness of note values. Some good musical playing. Some carelessness in small points. Tempos generally very good. A well played number. Tighten up on points mentioned and the result will be surprising.

Brampton Citizens' Band
A good band, with some strong points and weaknesses. Technique very good. Precision good, general style good. A tendency to roughness in full band playing. Clarinet tone hard in upper register. Intonation needs attention. Much incorrectness in not values. Balance and ensemble is generally good; deficient in heavy playing. Band can easily become very fine indeed by attention to points mentioned. It should have done better. A good performance.

The bands were placed in the following order in the competition:—
Chatham Killie Band, 91 points;
Owen Sound City Band, 89 1/2 points;
Lorne Scots Band, Georgetown, 88 1/2 points;
Brampton Citizens' Band, 87 points.
