### CORRESPONDENCE

Georgetown, Oct. 10th, 1939.  
To the Editor:  
Georgetown Herald.  
Dear Sir:

We note in your issue of last week an article entitled "Liquor Revenue," giving some figures from the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. These figures were evidently selected to indicate financial benefit to Canada of government controlled sale of alcoholic beverages.

One statement made was that eight of the provinces of Canada during the past eighteen years have received in liquor revenue 311 million dollars.

Being interested in this information, but, believing that BUSINESS COMMON SENSE demands that one should look at BOTH sides of the ledger we decided to find out, if possible, what was on the other side of this account; for to us as Canadian citizens who PAY THE BELLS, information is of vital concern.

We wrote therefore to the office of the Ontario Temperance Federation enclosing the Herald clipping and asking if they could give us the TOTAL EXPENDITURE for liquor of which this 311 million revenue was the government share. We quote in part Dr. Irwin's reply: "On looking up the Bureau's report, and calculating the expenditure in the eight provinces during the year of liquor control, I find they reached the sum of \$2,212,015,886.17. These expenditures are of necessity estimated. The figures from the Bureau are taken from the reports of the liquor control boards. Wherever there are beer rooms in a province, the Liquor Control Board sells to the beer rooms at a wholesale rate and also sells beer in case lots to private consumers, so that in their report the quantity of beer is represented by a wholesale figure, and if we are to get at the cost to the consumer we have to translate this into a corresponding retail figure. We have made a good deal of enquiry as to the spread between the wholesale and the retail price, and based on the facts disclosed we have made a calculation of the retail cost in each province. This is why in our report we put in the word 'estimated' since we can only reach the amount approximately.

The three hundred and eleven million is a mere bagatelle as compared with TWO BILLION TWO HUNDRED AND TWELVE MILLION."

It is our purpose, Mr. Editor, to place before your readers in future issues, further information on this question which assumes added importance at a time when conservation of our resources is absolutely essential. Wastefulness and self-indulgence at any time is unpatriotic. In war-time it is criminal.
