**ERIN FALL FAIR SETS NEW RECORD IN ATTENDANCE**

The fair grounds have been greatly improved during the past year, improvements including new sheep and swine pens. All exhibits of baking, butter and dressed poultry were shown under glass.

The fair was officially opened by Arnold Daroch, warden of Wellington County, who said that the fall fairs deserved the support given them in the past, not only from an educational standpoint, but also because of their social value.

An interested visitor to the fair was George McAllister, of Reddickville, who helped to plow the agricultural park for the first time 62 years ago.
