R. J. KERR, ACTON, DIED LAST WEEK

on Sunday he invariably was in his place in the family pew. But again we regret that the task of setting down all the work of good of this man in the community is an impossible one.

We who knew Mr. Kerr intimately realized that the loss of his beloved wife a year ago last February, was a blow from which he never recovered. Since that time many have noticed a little fading in his ability, but he carried on bravely, and never complaining, right until the end. In his work as an auctioneer and in his community activities, the writer came to know R. J. Kerr intimately. As the years passed over him they left no mark, only that of experience. He never grew old in mind or body. His company was as congenial as men many years his junior. His keen sense of humour and natural wit made it obvious to all that he was of Irish descent, which he often proclaimed. We met him often and his was the type of friendship and loyalty which wears well. We will always like to recall those trips to the fairs, plowing matches, anniversaries, and other outings he enjoyed and participated in with his many friends.

It would seem that Jonathan Edwards, who lived in the early part of the eighteenth century, had in mind such a man as Mr. Kerr, when he made that remark that has been handed down through these hundreds or more years: "A man of right spirit is greatly interested and concerned for the good of the community to which he belongs, and particularly of the city or village in which he resides, and for the true welfare of the society of which he is a member."

Two daughters, Mrs. J. C. Matthews, Acton, and Mrs. (Rev.) McLeod, Toronto, and three granddaughters, Miss Helen Ostrander, Acton, and Mrs. W. Sankey, Milton, and Miss Marjorie McLeod, Toronto, remain. Two sisters also remain, Mrs. James Eagle, Hamilton, and Mrs. James Rae, Forest. The community shares with these the loss all have sustained. With all his activity, his home and his family life held the major part of his love and it always had his first attention.

On Friday afternoon, after a private service at the home, and a service in the United Church, the body of the late R. J. Kerr was laid to rest in Fairview Cemetery, but the spirit of this man goes marching on and will continue to wield an influence for good and with that spirit continuing Acton's motto: "Fierest Actons" will be realized.
