## In the Spotlight

at Ottawa

Ottawa, Nov. 7th.—The whole empire cooperative air training plan has been worked out, and with the arrival of the Australian and New Zealand air delegates will be discussed in a conference of all countries participating. "We have been here only two weeks and have done a big job in that time" was the statement of Lord Rivedale, head of the British air mission. It is felt here that it will be a matter of profound satisfaction to the Canadian people to realize that consultations between the members of the British mission and the Canadian authorities have made such rapid progress in the important project which Mr. Mackenzie King, in his recent broadcast, said they were discussing. The final plan will be shaped on Canadian soil. Hon. F. V. Fairbairn, minister of civil aviation heads the Australian delegation and group captain H. W. L. Saunders the New Zealand delegation which will take part in the round table discussions which have now begun. Canada is represented by the Prime Minister, Mr. King, the finance minister, Mr. Ralston, the minister of national defence Mr. Rogers, and Mr. Howe, minister of transport. It will be readily seen why the presence of such training members of the Canadian cabinet is important to the success of the conference. Finance plays a vital role in such an immense program, so Mr. Ralston must be there. The Trans-Canada Air Lines are administered by the department of transport, under Mr. Howe, and the minister's experience in the establishment of Canada's peace time air lines will be invaluable. The joint conference will doubtless rapidly settle points still to be decided, and the plan launched as speedily as possible.

It is said that ultimately there will be about fifty schools located at most advantageous points throughout the country, and that about 25,000 airmen may annually be trained. It will, however, start on a more moderate scale, and expand. In choosing locations for training, other factors than the character of the ground, extent of snowfall, etc., will be considered and full advantage will be taken of the facilities of the Trans-Canada Air Lines. There will be a vast amount of work to be done in construction of air-dromes, of housing accommodations, of aircraft, and of other equipment. One of the matters to be decided in conference will be the apportionment of cost among the countries taking part. Airmen in Australia and New Zealand will receive preliminary training in their own countries; they will then come to the final instruction. Airmen will also come from Britain to go through final stages of training. Now that the arms embargo in the United States has been removed, planes may be brought across the border and some may be used for training other than aircraft. Aircraft may be brought from England. The staff of instructors is likely to be composed of experts from Britain as well as Canada.

In locating the Commonwealth air training centre in Canada, advantage has been taken of the country's relative immunity from air attack, and the relative ease with which aircraft can be transported from Canada to Britain. Aircraft manufacture will develop in Canada with the growth of the air training project.

### Political Controversy

The leader of the National Conservative party, Dr. Manion, has issued a statement in which he alleges that political patronage has been shown in the conduct of Canada's war work. The prime minister has replied asking for "specific details of political patronage in government appointments or in the awarding of contracts." He promised an immediate investigation. Dr. Manion stated his party had not been called in for consultation and advice since the close of last session. He said in relation to this: "The course followed by the government in keeping full control of our war program is probably best for Canada, as under our political system, an alert and constructively critical opposition is second only in importance to the government itself." In his reply Mr. King said the government welcomes constructive criticism. "Had matters arisen," he said, "which I felt required consultation with the leader of the Opposition I would immediately have requested a conference."

### Conference of Ministers in London

The opening days of November have seen the beginning of historic conferences of Commonwealth statesmen in London. The meetings are informal and there is no suggestion of an Imperial Cabinet. But if informal, these talks are none the less of vital importance to the cooperative effort in the prosecution of the war. It is not alone the question of expeditionary forces but of mobilizing the resources of foodstuffs, munitions and equipment with Mr. Creer, Minister of Mines and Resources, are Mr. Melvor of the Canadian Wheat Board, Mr. Shaw, of the department of agriculture and Mr. Wilgress of the department of trade and commerce. These experienced specialists will endeavor to secure and maintain a steady and expanding flow of Canadian products to the British market. Britain has been forced to adopt trade regulations in her time of stress. It will be the task of Canada's representatives to correlate our export trade with these regulations, so that Canada may play its normal and obvious part in the supply of wartime needs.

In Ottawa, the war supply board has formally taken over from the defence purchasing board. The war supply board acts as agents for the British purchasing commission for Great Britain in Canada. Steps are now being taken to provide extensive credits for an expansion of war equipment buying by Britain in this
