**GEORGETOWN RESIDENTS GRANTED NATURALIZATION IN HALTON COUNTY COURT**

Judge W. N. Munroe, of Milton, on Tuesday recommended naturalization for nine of the 11 men who applied for citizenship in the Halton County Court. Included in the number were three Germans who were quite emphatic about their desire to become Canadian citizens.

"I'll defend Canada if need be," and "My sympathies are with the country in which I live," were commonplace statements at the hearing. The Germans were Joseph Wagner and Joseph Hassenacher, of Georgetown, and Luis Feldmeier of Acton. Others accepted were: Ignace Lojcek and Wladyslaw Lewandowski, Russian-Poles, of Acton; Ony Faryneuk, Austrian, of Oakville; Gerrit Jan Kampjez, Dutchman, of Nelson Township; Charles Rici and Joseph Cavlovic, Jugo-Slavs, of Esquewaug Township. The majority of the applicants are farmers.

Judgment on two other men, a Pole and an Italian, was reserved pending further enquiry.
