A price cutting should be eliminated; put the small business man on an equal basis with his big competitor; eliminate secret rebates and all other methods by which the big fellow has the edge; stop the use of loss leaders and all the other evils that are strangling legitimate business in this country and progress will be made," said the speaker.

Mr. Robinson: Yes, there is greater expense in breeding.
The resolution from Gray County was endorsed.
When the main business of the day concluded, Mr. Jas. Hewson took the chair and the following resolution was passed: "Moved by Mr. McNiven, seconded by Mr. Kerns, that the thanks of this council be tendered to Mr. Hall for the courteous and impartial manner in which he presided over the deliberations of this council and for the prompt attention given county business during the year." Individually members of the council expressed their warm appreciation of Mr. Hall's efficient and friendly leadership and regretted his expressed intention of resignation. It was hinted by several that Mr. Hall's purpose in retiring was to seek higher honors in the political field, but this rumor Mr. Hall emphatically denied. With easy and dignified eloquence Mr. Hall thanked the council for the confidence placed in him by his colleagues, following which the council adjourned.
