#### COUNTY HAS SURPLUS **CUT DEBT \$50,000**

An approximate surplus of \$3500 for 1939 is revealed in an annual Halton county financial statement. The county debenture debt is seen to have dropped \$50,000 during the past year. The debenture debt has decreased \$340,400 where it stood at \$390,000 year ago. County officials estimate that Halton will be free of debt
