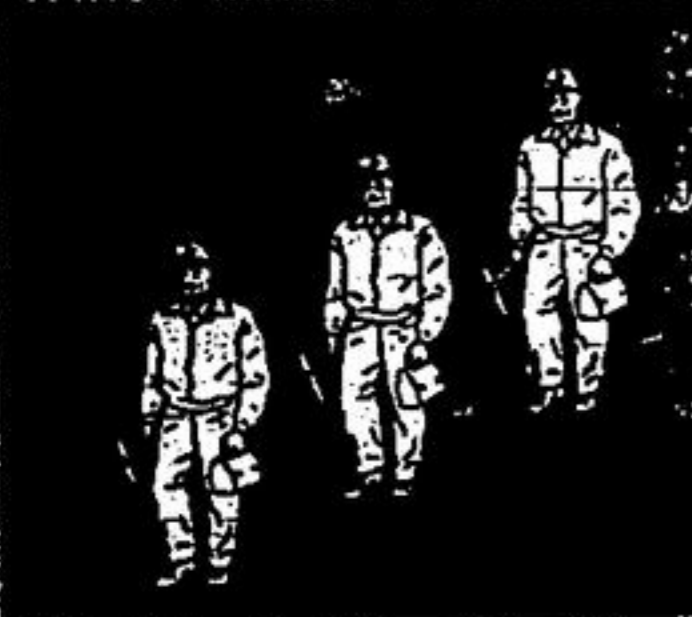

She resided in Nassagaweya all her life up until the last few years, when she resided in Toronto. Miss Bennett was of a very cheerful and kind disposition, and although ill for some time, was patient and loving to the end. The funeral took place Saturday from Mr. Harold McClure's funeral home. RICHARD SHAW MARSHALL

In the passing on Tuesday, January 16th, 1940, in St. Michael's Hospital, Toronto, of Richard Shaw Marshall, Limehouse and surrounding district has lost a beloved and highly esteemed citizen. Mr. Marshall had been a resident of Limehouse since 1877 and was a prominent figure in the early life of the community. Always interested in the betterment and welfare of the community, Mr. Marshall had taken an active part in local affairs, and had served on the Board of School Trustees. He was a member of the Limehouse Presbyterian Church and a regular attendant at the services. The late Mr. Marshall was born in Bolton, Ontario, England, November 18th, 1855, a son of the late William and Mary Marshall, and came to Canada two years later. His wife, the former Margaret Lawson, predeceased him about twelve years ago. Surviving are two daughters and five sons, William, Olive, Winnifred, and Alfred Marshall, Toronto; John Marshall, North Bay; Earl Marshall, Acton, and Robert Marshall, Novato, California. Deceased was of a friendly, cheery disposition, and in his younger days took a keen interest in athletics, and the promotion of clean sport among the young people. This interest endeared him to each succeeding generation, and this was evidenced by the large number of young people who attended his funeral.

To the Electors of Georgetown AND OTHERS WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

This notice is in regards to the Election on December 4th, 1939 for Hydro Commissioner, when I asked the Voters for their support to elect me to the position of Hydro Commissioner for the Town of Georgetown.

Before going into the matter of why I am not a member of the Hydro Commission, I feel I owe the public and those that sponsored my nomination, my many, many thanks for their kindness and the trouble they went too, to elect me on December 4th, 1939, and it is with the greatest of regret that I have to state that I had to retire from the Commission owing to being a Division Court Clerk.

When I signed my qualification papers I was not aware that the Municipal Act declares that a Clerk of the Division Court was barred from holding a position of any kind pertaining to the Corporation of any town or city, and it was not drawn to my attention until January, 1940, one month later, by the Chairman of the Hydro Commission, whose duty it was to notify me.

Upon receiving notice from the Chairman (Mr. Dayfoot) I immediately looked into the matter and found The Municipal Act stated, "the Clerk of a Division Court cannot act on the Municipal Hydro Commission," therefore I had misrepresented myself in my qualification papers and if I allowed myself to be sworn into office, I would be stating a falsehood.

I regret very much the error on my part and most humbly apologize to the Electors for the trouble caused through no fault of my own nor the officials of the Town.

Had I allowed myself to be sworn in, I then could have been disqualified should any person so desire to do so.

Again expressing my thanks to the Electors, and I trust they will accept my apology for this error, I am
