In the Spotlight

at Ottawa

 Ottawa, Jan. 23. — The stage is set for the last session of parliament which opens on the 25th. That it will be the last, there can be little doubt; every sign points to the probability of a short session followed by a course by an election. War measures, that is the whole policy followed by the government to prepare Canada to take its part in the struggle, will occupy most of the time of both houses.

On the domestic issues which are on the agenda, the government's unemployment insurance and the St. Lawrence Waterways are perhaps outstanding. The social insurance scheme has a bearing of post-war conditions rather than wartime, as war industries will gradually take up the slack in employment. Unemployment insurance would be a measure of social security for the period when the country is settling down to peace time conditions. An effort is being made to get three provinces, which have heretofore withheld approval, to agree to an amendment to the constitution which will give the Dominion government the power to make such a law.

The question of approval from Ontario and the prospects as well as the St. Lawrence seaway have become a little more obscure with the attitude taken by the Ontario house on the Dominion's war effort. In the case of both social insurance and the seaway collaborations between the provincial and Dominion Governments is essential, and the Ontario government's vote of censure of the government's conduct of the war makes the collaboration look rather dark. In relation to the criticism of the government's war measures, the Prime Minister, Mr. King said he would reserve until parliament assembled what he had to say on that subject. Parliament would meet in a few days, and meanwhile the government does not intend to permit Canada's war effort in the present war to be prejudiced by fostering any controversy which does not permit of the most complete presentation and consideration of all relevant facts.

The success of Canada's first war loan of 200 million dollars has brought cheer to the capital. The books might easily have been closed last Tuesday, after they had been open only two days because by that time the loan had been oversubscribed by 25 per cent. It was held open, however, until five p.m. local time Friday for the benefit of the small investor. This action bore good fruit. There was a further great response from all parts of the country, and records now show that despite the heavy subscriptions from many large corporations and institutions, about one half or more of the total amount of the loan was taken up by investors in amounts of \$5,000 and less. The fifty dollar bond was very popular and the desire of the authorities to have the loan a thoroughly "democratic" one has been fully realized.

A promising increase in recent months. Exports in December were 46 per cent higher than in December, 1939. Through collaboration with the British ministry of shipping, despite the handicaps and dangers of war, the growing trade with Britain, so essential to the allied war effort, will be kept moving. Trade with the United States also expanding will run along normal channels. But to maintain the country's financial strength, trade with other countries must be kept moving smoothly and efficiently. This trade in the case of many countries is growing rapidly. South America being one section of the world to which Canadian exports are expanding to a marked degree. The problem is also secure tonnage for this trade as it is needed and avoid delays in shipment. United States neutrality laws and curtailment through war conditions of available vessels from other neutrals make the question one that keeps Canadian shipping authorities fully occupied. It seems probable that following a recent visit by officials to Washington some American vessels may be chartered although United States laws will prevent these ships from calling at Canadian ports except St. John, N.B., and Pacific ports as other ports come within the prescribed war zone which United States ships are forbidden to enter.

Dr. Henry Laureys, economist and author of Montreal, has been appointed High Commissioner for Canada to the Union of South Africa. Canada has now representatives in all the Dominions.

Sir William Muir celebrates his 96th birthday on January 19, and declared he was still looking to the future. In the Indian Summer of his days, he has received very much from the hard fighting and gruff Postmaster General of Laurier's time. As Chief Justice of Ontario up to a few years ago, he was the first judge to turn up at Osprede Hall in the morning and the last to leave, generally to spend the afternoon with some cronies playing bridge. At 96, he still

removes his spectacles to read, and the suspicion obtains that even at this late date, he can see as far into the stone wall as any man in Canada.
