TO THE ELECTORS OF HALTON:

Since my last letter the Conservative executive of Halton called and held a make-believe National Convention at Milton. The hypocrisy of the yet up at that Convention has raised to such indignation among the better thinking Conservatives of the County that comments from me are needless. One of their own number has completely exposed the political intrigue which went on behind the scenes with the full knowledge and active co-operation of the present national candidate for the county. In view of all this political log-rolling on his part to oust the candidate in the field and to secure the nomination for himself, I myself at a complete loss to understand how he would have the temerity to now pose as an independent citizen far above and such things as "party politics." Instead of being a national convention, it was a Conservative convention called by the Conservative executive; only fifty delegates from the entire County and none were posted until two days before the Convention. The past was signed by the President of the Conservative executive and the fact that the convention was called to nominate a candidate to support Hon. R. J. Munton. To make sure that no un-arraigned would occur a groundless charge was made against the Conservative executive. Certain things have been done to bring about a National Convention.

In view of my opponent's last letter to the County press, which is filled with insinuations and attempts to lead to doubt the number in attendance at the Convention and in general of the extremely questionable methods which were used by him in Oakville as a build up to obtain the nomination in this County in any event, a deliberate attempt is being made to make a groundless charge based on alleged neglect of soldier's dependents. You are entitled to the facts which are as follows: On January 17th the Toronto Telegram came out with a page wide headline in large block letters: "Mothers of soldiers' dependents left in dire need. Canada must wipe out this stain." And then followed the charge that Dr. Manion had received thousands of letters from across Canada complaining that separation allowances to wives of soldiers had not been paid. I immediately wired Dr. Manion for names and addresses for the complaints in Halton County in order that I might investigate and see that the wrongs were righted. His reply was that I ought to know better than to meddle in the district in which he was anxious to correct the matter. Instead of playing politics about it, would he please give me the names, and I am still waiting for this information. His Oakville supporters, taking their cue from Dr. Manion, organized an indignation deputation to wait on the Oakville council and once again the Toronto Telegram came out with a page wide heading "Soldiers' Families said almost destitute." Mr. George Atkins in his paper stated that he was the spokesman for this deputation, though I see from the deputation that Major Pullen also took a prominent part in the matter. I immediately phoned Major Pullen, told him I was sorry to hear of distress among soldiers' families in Oakville and would he please give me the names and addresses so that I could have the distress remedied. He told me he did not know any names. I phoned the third man on the deputation from him. I then phoned Mr. George Atkins and he told me he knew of two names but thought there were more. I urged him to get all of the names and to pass the information along. I finally received four names and made a personal visit to each of the homes. I found that three of the names—the soldiers had enlisted on the 9th and 11th of the month and the indignation protest was made on the 15th of the same month. As to the fourth, this was the case of a married woman whose husband had deserted her five years ago last September. This was a special case and everyone would concede that special legislation could not be passed to cover such an exceptional case. However, I at once went to Ottawa, interviewed Major Raymond of the Soldiers' Dependents Allowance Board and laid the facts before him. He told me of the type of affidavit evidence he would require to

prove the desertion and the non-support and I received an assurance that when this was forthcoming the matter would be promptly dealt with. I procured the required material, sent it to Ottawa and on Saturday last received a long distance telephone call advising me that the allowance had been granted.

I will leave it to my readers to form their own conclusions, as to whether this deputation was sincere in its protest or whether my opponents were simply playing "cheap party politics." I do not know of anything more harmful to our war effort than the publication of false reports of this nature, accusing the government of callousness to wives of our soldiers. In any human effort mistakes are sure to occur but I did hope that in connection with the prosecution of the war where the stakes are so high, this country would be spared from this type of propaganda. Everyone appreciates the sacrifice which our men are making who have enlisted for active service, and we all want their dependents to be fairly treated.

It is a fact that in regard to enlistment soldiers' families may encounter serious distress between the date of enlistment and the date when the first pay cheque will have been earned. Surely it is not expecting too much to ask each local community to deal generously with such cases. In Burlington we have set aside \$7000 of our Red Cross collections to send parcels to the men on service and to take care of the emergency conditions of their wives and dependents. I do not know of any better use to which Red Cross funds could be devoted, but in communities where they do not care to do this special funds should be provided.

They have proven their superiority on the ice through playing the game and playing it well. This thought gives us the more pleasure and real satisfaction than any cups or titles obtained by other means. Our "Silver-Strikes" will be in there battling to the finish and every person in this town owes it to himself to be in the arena tomorrow night for the second game with Milton. Let's all get out and cheer the boys to victory.
