DR. F. W. ROUTLEY ON RETURN FROM ENGLAND DESCRIBES PLANS

The Canadian Red Cross Society is setting up its storage facilities in France as fast as possible, and in the closest co-ordination with the British Red Cross, so as to be ready when the Canadian Active Service Force goes into action...

In the meantime Canada's supplies in France will be available to the British Red Cross should they be needed in a hurry. Dr. Routley, national commissioner of the Canadian Red Cross, landed from the liner Washington after a visit of several weeks to Great Britain...

He said the First Division Hospital being built at Taplow, Viscount's estate, will be ready for operation April 1, with facilities for 600 patients and capable of caring for 1000 in an emergency.

It will be the last word in a military hospital, Dr. Routley said, "It is a hut type hospital of steel, brick, concrete and asbestos, and will have all the modern facilities of any hospital anywhere."
