Halton Farmers Study Hog Business at Toronto Packing Plant

Halton farmers to a number of 220 recently visited the plant of Canada Packers in Toronto where they availed themselves of the opportunity of seeing for themselves just what happens to the bacon hog after it is delivered to the plant...

On arrival at the Plant of Canada Packers the respective groups were welcomed by Mr. Hugh Murray, Manager of the Provisions Department, who outlined the plans for the day. For the first hour and a half, small groups each with a guide were taken for a tour of the plant where the busy saw how various pork products are processed. It has frequently been stated that the hog on which the farmers suggest a discount is sold over the counter at the same price as the A grade carcass...

Following the tour of the plant the group devoted a well spent hour out in the hog pens where under the direction of W. L. McMullen, chief hog grader of the Federal Department of Agriculture, eight live hogs of various types and finishes were shown to each member of the party recorded his impressions on a card supplied for the purpose. These cards were retained for reference when viewing the carcasses on the rail later in the day but more of that later.

Immediately following the complimentary dinner, each group spent an hour on the killing floor where they saw in addition to various dressing operations, the inspection of the carcasses by Health of Animals Branch inspectors, weighing of the individual carcasses by the electrically operated scale which automatically stamps in duplicate the weight of the carcass on a ticket placed on the carcass and finally they also saw the grading of the individual carcass by the Government grader.

Up to this point everything was lovely but the whole gang landed in the cooler—the hog cooler. Here were hanging the carcasses of the hogs they had graded alive before dinner. If seems as believing, one must confess that you cannot tell what is under a hog's skin until you get a look inside. What looked to be the best hog on foot in most cases hung up an over finished carcass. The carcasses of the four hogs which had been judged alive showed some interesting revelations. In any event, most of us had to admit we didn't know much about the carcasses of the hogs awarded by Canada Packers for the respective judging competitions were as follows: Nelson—Reg. Smith, Palermo. Trafaigar—Cameron Wilson, Milton. Esqueasing—Wilfred Leslie, Georgetown.

Nassagaways—Dalton Barber, A.O. On. Some who had been rather doubtful about rail grading came home convinced it is the only way to sell hogs, and furthermore, it is the only way to build up the quality of our hogs to a point where they will compare with the Danish product. The bacon situation was summed up by W. P. Watson of the Ontario Livestock Branch, who by charts prepared from marketings of the past year demonstrated where we stand and what we must do to fill the requirements of our bacon agreements with Great Britain and what we must do if we are to retain the British market at the conclusion of the war. The trip also included a visit to the Shur Gain Farm near Weston where some interesting experiments were noted. From comments and discussions heard on the respective trips were made, one cannot help but feel that the project was one of the most worthwhile ever undertaken by the Halton Livestock Improvement Association. In that the tours clarified much of the misunderstanding previously in existence with reference to rail grading and hog marketing, furthermore, created a better spirit of confidence between the producer and processor which after all is essential if a worthwhile livestock industry is to be built up in Canada.

other capital obligations, including sinking fund and equipment principal payments, amounting to \$8,162,745. A new issue dated January, 1939, of \$50,000,000 Canadian National Railway Company Dominion Guaranteed Bonds was made, the proceeds being used to retire matured obligations and temporary loans from the Government. The issue comprised \$15,000,000 2 1/2% seven year bonds and \$35,000,000 3% twenty year bonds. In July, an issue of \$6,500,000 Canadian National Railway 2 1/2% Equipment Trust Certificates was made to provide for the payment in part of new equipment costing more than \$8,700,000. During the year, additional calls aggregating 11 per cent, or \$560,000, on the capital stock (\$5,000,000) of Trans-Canada Air Lines were met by the Canadian National Railway Company. To December 31, 1939, the amount subscribed was \$3,750,000. During the year, \$9,418,948 was spent on rolling stock, including 1,950 box cars, 40 refrigerator cars, 25 cabooses, 50 box-baggage cars, 9 buffet-sleeping cars, 5 mail-express cars, 10 baggage cars, 11 snow plows and 8 work units. To meet anticipated war requirements, additional orders were placed for 2,765 box cars, 500 flat cars and 25 northern type locomotives, to be delivered and accounted for in 1940. 60 Locomotives, 5,044 freight cars, 27 passenger cars and 477 work units were retired during the year, the loss on which has been accounted for by the "air" expense of operation. Air conditioning of passenger cars cost \$445,100. All principal main line trains are now air-conditioned. The Hotel Vancouver, operated jointly by the Canadian National and the Canadian Pacific Railways, was completed and opened. The Senneterre Rouyn branch line through the gold and copper region of northwestern Quebec was completed, and work on the Montreal terminal development was materially advanced. Reference is made in the report to the Royal Tour and to His Majesty's expression of "appreciation of the uniform excellence of the railway service on his long journey through Canada."
