SERVICES OF SUPERINTENDENT RETAINED AT HOUSE OF REFUGE

 report termed the installation, made without reference to either county council, as "a flagrant violation of the rules of the house," and added that "the English language does not contain words suitable to the expression of our condemnation of this installation."
 The commission was also accused of indifference in passing a resolution dealing with the late James Cation, and of precipitate action in two other cases.
 Check on Deaths
 A list of recommendations included in the report was dealt with by the joint meeting.—The secretary-treasurer was instructed to keep a closer check on deaths of inmates and advise the old age pension, as an entry in the accounts of the institution had shown that the home management had to make a refund of \$240 for pension money paid on account of a deceased inmate for a period of twelve months.
 A recommendation that censorship of mail should be discontinued had already been put into effect on the order of the Minister of Public Welfare. Fire drill once a month was adopted. The reduction of the House of Refuge dairy herd was placed in the hands of the commission, and it was moved that larger quarters be provided for housing some of the animals.
 Better ventilation of the living room of the home was recommended, and it was ruled that a copy of the Inspector's report, hereafter to be placed in the hands of the clerks of both counties.
 Warden A. D. McBride of Peel and Warden George Finney, of Halton, with J. J. Jamieson, secretary-treasurer of the home, and Miss Ethel Bennett, Peel, were requested to constitute to re-draft the rules and regulations of the home, which, an adoption by the two counties, will be forwarded to the Lieutenant-Governor in Council for approval. A motion to increase the membership of the home commission from four to five was defeated.
