L. M. MONTGOMERY HAS WRITTEN 21 BOOKS

Speaking at the Kitchener-Waterloo Business and Professional Women's Club on Monday night, L. M. Montgomery (Mrs. "Rev." E. Macdonald, formerly of Norval) related some amusing facts concerning her writings and the publishing of her book "Anne of Green Gables." Mrs. Montgomery, who wrote the story of the fiery-haired orphan girl more than 30 years ago, said that since its publication, which was delayed by five straight rejections by publishers, she has received letters from all over the world. At present, she is wading through a 40-page letter from a fan in Vancouver, reading a page or so each day. She has had letters from Australia, Jerusalem, Poland, Finland, Czechoslovakia, which added together makes the largest fan mail of any person in Canada. All of her letters the author answers personally.

After being rejected so often, Mrs. Montgomery said, "Anne of Green Gables" was put away and lay in a bottom drawer for two years, until it tumbled out in a bout of house-cleaning. Dusted off, the manuscript was sent off to a Boston publisher and fell into the hands of a girl from Prince Edward Island, who persuaded the publishers to print it because it was written about her home province. Mrs. Macdonald said she laid the plot of her story in the Maritime Province lest any members of her husband's Ontario congregations might feel that they were being written about. In all she has written 21 books.

GARDENING

HANDLING SHRUBBERY

In the informal garden plan the taller shrubs, such as the common spruce, honey suckle, forsythia, syringa or lilac, to be placed farthest back. In front of the smaller shrubs, like the barberry in different shades of foliage, the low spruces, the dentzia or similar things that never exceed three or four feet in height at maturity. In this class, too, will come many of the perennial flowers, iris, phlox, peonies, plants of medium height and which, like all perennials, when once planted and established, will come up each year and flower with very little further attention.

BROKEN LINES

Nature detests straight lines. In gardening the amateur is well advised to follow this natural example. Straight, narrow fences, abrupt and cramping corners, around garage or house, narrow, straight sidewalk, all unduly emphasize the confining limits of small lots. These, however, can be made to appear many times more spacious if the fences and walls are par-

tially covered with vines, if corners are screened with shrubbery, leading down to tall annual flowers.

BARE SPOTS IN LAWNS

Beneath bare spots on the lawn will usually be found poor or sour soil underneath; it will be necessary to dig up, remove any gravel or stones, filling up with good earth and sowing thickly with a good quality of Canadian grass seed. For this purpose and for new lawns it is always best to get a good mixture of high quality packaged grass seed blended by expert seedsmen.
