## A Fertilizer Test on the Bird Farm

Last summer on the farm of Mr. John M. Bird, near Georgetown, a very interesting test of oat varieties and fertility management was conducted. Through the Department of Chemistry, O.A.C. and the Halton Department of Agriculture, the fertility tests were made possible.

Mr. Bird was one of the good farmers of his section, and has for years given considerable study to his crops. The soil where the test was conducted was a light Clay Loam, slightly rolling. It has produced a crop of grain in 1938, and had been ploughed out of alfalfa in 1937, after which it had received a top-dressing of manure.

Mr. Bird tells the story of the test as follows: "A soil test showed that the soil was low in Nitrogen and Phosphorus. Consequently I received 1 bag of 2-12-6 and 1 of 2-16-6 fertilizer to be applied each on a half acre plot with a check plot without any fertilizer, between them.

This Spring, seeding got under way about the 1st of May. By cultivating and harrowing two ways, a good seed-bed with plenty of moisture was obtained, and the plots were sown on May 8th. Growth was fairly rapid during the early part of the season, and all 3 plots made an equal start.

About 10 days after the grain came up, the plot where the 2-16-6 had been applied began to show more growth than either of the other plots, and compared about equal with another section of the field which had been sown two days previous. Throughout the entire season the 2-16-6 plot maintained a lead in growth over the 2-12-6 plot and both showed a marked contrast to the check plot, not only in growth but also in stand of plants.

Both the 2-16-6 and 2-12-6 plots began to come into head at the same time, although I noticed the 2-16-6 plot seemed to reach the stage where it was in full head more quickly than the 2-12-6 plot. Both the fertilized plots were in full head 3 days ahead of the check plot.

The same observations were made while the grain was ripening; the 2-16-6 plot always holding an edge on the 2-12-6, and showing much more length of straw, longer plumper heads, and a much thicker stand of plants than the check plot.

The plots were inspected on June 26th, and harvesting was started on July 27th. Samples were taken by cutting three rows, 1 rod long in 4 average sections of each plot. These samples were sent to the Agricultural College at Guelph, and there they were threshed and the yields calculated. Contrary to my expectations, the plot which took the lead throughout the season was not the highest yielding.

The 2-12-6 plot took first place with 70.1 bus. per acre, weighing 40 lbs. per bus.

The 2-16-6 plot was next with 64.7 bus. per acre, weighing 40.5 lbs. per bus.

The check plot with no fertilizer yielded 53.6 bus. per acre weighing 38.5 lbs. per bus.

The entire field contains 11 acres. Using these results as a basis, and the price of oats at 40c per bus., the total values of the crop would be; with 2-12-6 fertilizer \$306.40; with 2-16-6 fertilizer \$294.40, and without fertilizer \$235.60. By purchasing 1 ton and 1/2 of fertilizer at dealer's price \$29.25 (3 12-8) per ton and sowing it on the whole field and taking for granted the yields would be the same, my profit would have been \$29.43.

I have found this soil fertility experiment very interesting and informing and certainly well worth-while."

Mr. Bird was winner of Second Prize in a contest with 24 other farmers in 5 Counties.

NOTICE is hereby given that all residents of Georgetown are required forthwith to clean their cellars, drains, yards, pig styes, water closets, outbuildings, and other premises and remove therefrom all dirt, manure and other substances which may endanger the public health, and to have same completed by the 15th day of May next, on which day the sanitary inspector will commence a general inspection; and further take notice that the section of the Public Health Act prohibiting the keeping of hogs between the 15th day of May and 15th day of November except in pens at least 70 feet from any dwelling and 50 feet from any street or lane, with floors kept clean from all standing water and regularly cleaned will be strictly enforced.
