MOVING TO ORGANIZATION

The stir that is taking place in agricultural circles is a good indication of a keener business interest in affairs by the farmers generally. But what form this will develop into is difficult at the moment to visualize. Here in Halton Mr. Hughes Cleaver is endeavoring to find a solution to the problem by holding meetings at various points with the farmers. This seems the first step taken aright since the complaint must first be located before any cure can be sought.

Without a doubt the farmer has justification for complaint, too. The spread in prices between what he receives and what he pays makes him set one that demands extra long hours to bring any measure of compensation—hours much different from those enjoyed by the factory or town work.

It is well, however, to consider the matter very fully before making any move at a false cure. The trouble has not all developed in a short time and therefore cannot be cured overnight. Farmers need to organize as any other group, but it seems that organization when formed would be well advised to give undivided attention to the farmer's problems and not confuse his politics or the buying and selling of things not produced on the farm. In other words, the farmers may need

to become like other businesses have found advantageous—highly specialized. We are pleased to see a start made on the work. We will all watch it with interest, hoping a solution is found and realizing full well that prosperity of the farmers reflects in better business for all.

STUPID SENSATIONALISM

Toronto evening papers again lost their heads completely when the war moved north into Norway last week. Both the Star and Tely brought out a series of extras with the wildest sort of rumors splashed all across the front page.

They printed anything they could get their hands on without even the feeblest attempt to check the accuracy of the report. Some of their stories were obviously absurd, such as that which declared British warships had entered Oslo fiord and at the same time declared German transports were still unloading troops there. If one took the trouble to add up the number of ships reported sunk, then more than the total Reich navy was at the bottom of the sea by last Thursday morning.

Both these papers declared in heavy black type that practically every asset in Norway had been captured and
