Among the community services which are being maintained by the CBC on its summer schedule is "Neighbourly News from the Weeklies," with Andy Clarke reviewing the happenings in rural Ontario and penning the news in a weekly "Wings by Air Waves" column. "Wings by Air Waves" will be wearing an old straw hat and toting a fishing rod a good many times this summer, but on Sunday mornings at 10:00 o'clock (Eastern Daylight Saving Time) he will be at his microphone with all the Ontario weeklies spread out before him. Rural listeners whose communities are remaining on Standard Time, will tune in at 9:00 a.m. and it is for the convenience of church-goers who wish to attend morning service that the broadcast gets up an hour earlier throughout the summer months.

Farm Broadcast Department Enlarged

The CBC Farm Broadcast Department plans to have the final link in a Dominion-wide chain of Farm Broadcasts early in June. Mr. O. J. W. Shugg, Supervisor of the Farm Broadcast Department, says that the British Columbia setting up a Farm Broadcast for that region. With the commencement of the British Columbia broadcast, the CBC will have a Farm Broadcast on the air every week-day from coast to coast. The first regular CBC Farm Broadcast began in Toronto in February, 1939. Since then, a similar programme is originating in Halifax and another in Winnipeg. With the British Columbia programme, a complete and detailed service will be available to every farmer in Canada.

Interest in Sport Links Nation

Time zones and provincial boundaries are no barrier to the nation-wide fraternity to be found in the world of sport, according to Harry "Red" Foster. On Red's Weekly Sports Parade, Saturday, April 20, he conducted the first service at the Canadian Exhibition after his retirement from active hockey had been announced by the Maple Leaf's management, and on the same broadcast there were two other guests. One was Buss Robertson, who does the broadcast from the Montreal stadium, and the other was the popular Marty Burke, coach of the Stampeders, known to every western sports fan.

Interesting Character in CBC Recital

Eric Tridwell is a baritone soloist because he wants to be, and for no other reason. He tried as many occupations before he was 20 as most of us contemplate in a lifetime. He was born in Bristol, England, commenced travelling at an age when he needed his mother's advice on the itinerary and the menu, and after a few years in Canadian schools, went to the coast to work in the fishing industry. New Broadcast From Overseas

CBC is to broadcast a Weekly News Letter, direct from London, on Thursdays at 7:30 p.m. EDST. This news budget is prepared and presented specially for Canadian listeners by the CBC's programme unit now overseas, and will, of course, have news of the Canadian troops abroad as well as countless other items of interest to Canadians at home.

Guns for Peace

For the first time in her history, Canada is manufacturing armaments. Scenes recorded during the performance of various operations of manufacture and assembly, actual sound pictures of testing by a crew under the direction of an Ordnance Officer, demonstrations of precision instruments never before used in Canadian industry, and the whole compelling story of the men, women and materials employed in the Canadian armament industry, round out a feature broadcast which will be presented from CBC's Toronto studios Friday, May 10, 8:00 to 8:30 p.m. EDST. 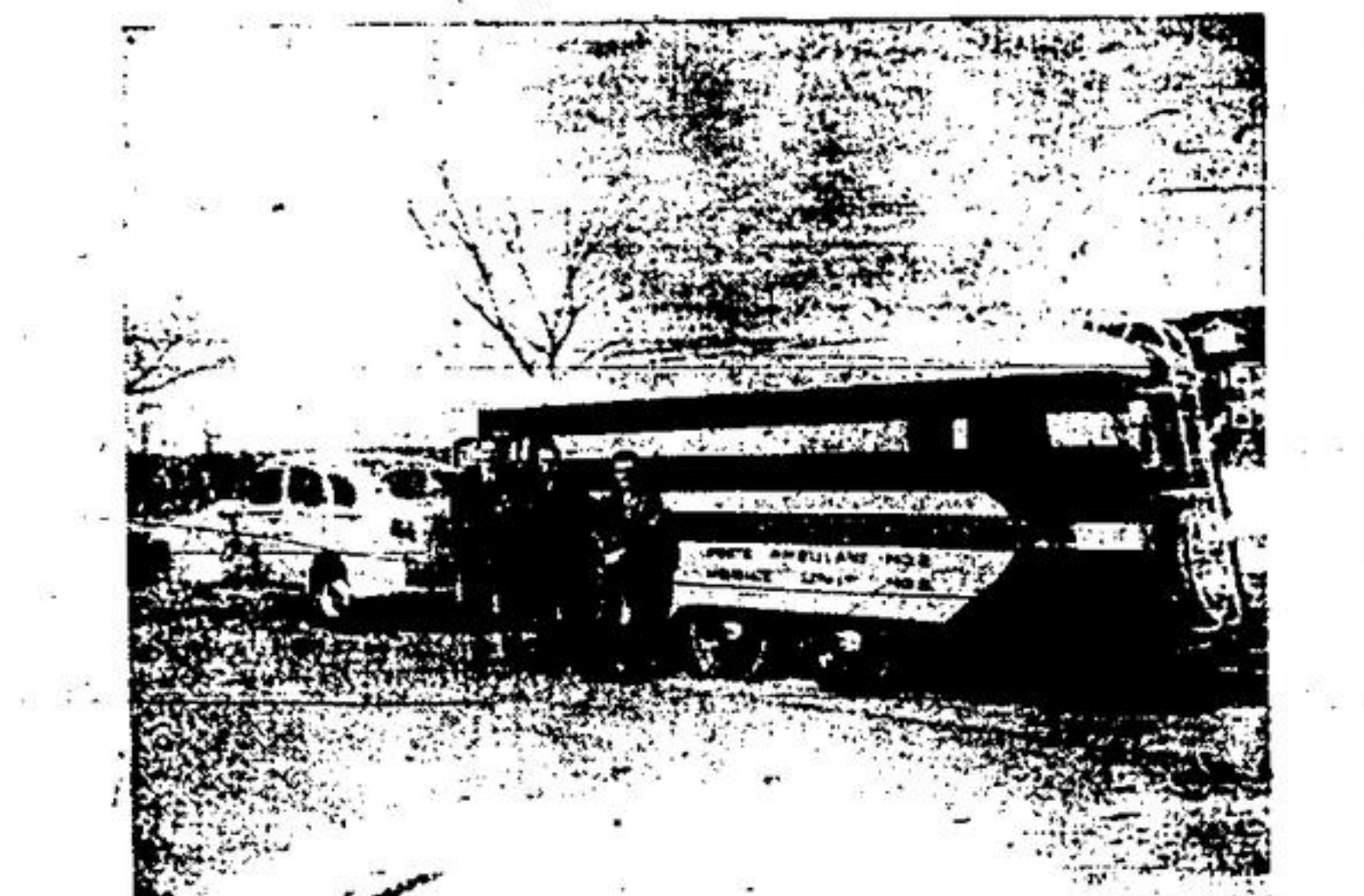

This is one of the two Mobile Units used by the Special Events Department of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation. It was specially designed by CBC engineers to provide facilities for broadcasting from places where it would not ordinarily be possible - sports events, ceremonies, news happenings, and any number of things in which listeners are interested. Shown standing beside the trailer are T. O. Wickland, of CBC's Special Events Department, C. W. Speer, and Marcel Henry, engineers.

It's housecleaning time for the streamlined Mobile Units of CBC Special Events Department. The big silver grey trailers are being overhauled, painted, and fitted with new gadgets that will increase the already wide range of service that they can perform for CBC listeners. The trailers contain transmitting equipment that can broadcast for a radius of 50 miles, as well as portable peak transmitters that can be used in a boat, in the woods, or in other inaccessible places. These travelling units are also fitted with equipment for making records of sound effects or descriptive content, which may later be incorporated in feature broadcasts. The trailer contains a small soundproof studio, where a commentator can sit while broadcasting or conducting an interview. The commentator can also sit on the roof of the trailer while it is moving, and broadcast a running description of some event.
