Might I suggest that in theory, the members of the Senate were to be chosen from the citizenry at large, and it is a perversion of the high purpose when it is filled with discarded politicians, and a great injustice to the people to have these discards with their prejudices foisted on us for life.

Besides all that, Miss Mcphail chose to join the small number of members of Parliament-who became professional politicians.
