A Minister's Call, 21, 22

There is the reality of deep spiritual experience back of the phrase "a call to the ministry." For many ministers, this has come through a sense of compulsion. They did not personally choose their work; they were led into it. To do anything else would be less than the highest for them. Sometimes the call has come through the challenge to meet a definite need. At other times the possession of certain gifts has indicated fitness for ministerial service. We have no doubt that Jeremiah was called of God. He spoke truth to his hurt. He readily suffered persecution for his convictions. His spoke words which have enduring value because of their beauty, truth and power. He had a vision for his nation greater than that of the business and political leaders of his day. He had a moral discernment about right and wrong that quickened the consciences of other people. There were false prophets in the nation who were seeking popularity and gain, but the testing of the centuries has shown that Jeremiah had a genuine inspiration from God.
