INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

their work, but many men in difficult places are cheered by their confidence that the God who called them will lead and sustain them.

A Minister's Faith, 23, 24
 Remembering the forces of evil at work in the world, any student for the ministry may well qualify before undertaking the work. If he becomes a minister through self-confidence, he will receive a rude awakening. But if his faith is in God, he will discover that his faith is vindicated, year by year. Following conscience, his moral discrimination becomes keener. Depending upon God, he discovers that God's leading is available. The God of heaven and earth responds to those who earnestly seek him. A minister's message is good news about God and unless the minister is rejoicing in the good news himself, he cannot tell it effectively to other people. Jeremiah might be cast into a dungeon but the care of God, Jeremiah's nation might have to suffer exile but they learned that the spirit of God could work in the nation even when in captivity. A minister becomes a herald of the gospel when in his own experience he has learned that he can have first-hand dealings with God.

A Minister's Temptation, 25 - 27
 Instead of being immune from temptations, ministers have subtle temptations all their own. There is the danger of assuming moral superiority by reason of a position of leadership. Constantly there is the temptation to speak smooth things and to say "peace," when there is no peace. It is difficult to act from unimpaired motives, seeking to do the will of God with no thought of popularity, promotion or security. In times of crisis, there is often a temptation to claim divine authority for self-will. How may temptations be overcome? Victory can be found only through closer fellowship with God and rigorous, long-continued self-discipline. Recently a minister, ninety-nine years of age, died, honoured by all who knew him. Everyone knew that he was a superlatively good man. He had secured this reputation not by practising any arts or wiles but by fifty years of disciplined living. True prophets command respect and hold royalties.

A Minister's Mission, 28, 29
 The great temptation of a modern minister is to be a popular preacher and to attract crowds by sensationalism. The pity is that these methods sometimes bring outward success. Church advertisements sometimes have a catchword appeal, as though there were no great moral issues to be discussed. It requires hard study and long hours of toil to have three or four solid and helpful addresses prepared for delivery each week. Glibness, jocularly and trifling with holy things may attract certain people but enduring congregations are built up by substance, not by chaff. Which humanity facing the uncertainties of world politics today, there is no time for pretence or shallow thinking in the pulpit. A British poet described the preaching of "modernity" by saying: "The Sunday sheep look up but are not led." The power of preaching is demonstrated when a holy man of God

states principles and proclaims truths so that a whole community is vitalized morally and spiritually, and religion becomes a living power.

A Minister's Nemesis, 30-32
 Jeremiah dared to expose the false prophets of his day — men who plagiarized the words of others, purposeless men who discussed fanciful theories. In the judgment of God, said Jeremiah, such teachers could not profit their nation at all. There are few things so tragic in religious experience as when a preacher has nothing to preach and has lost his sense of divine mission. Paul trembled lest having preached to others, he himself might become a castaway. Great preachers such as Paul and Jeremiah did not have easy lives. They were tempted from within and from without, but they triumphed through faith. Any minister who is weakening can be restored by turning to the life of Jesus Christ, the Great Teacher, discovering his motives, learning from his methods, and quickening his conscience at Christ's cross. The moral welfare of the nation depends in great degree upon preachers and teachers. They can be good shepherds.

The Department also reserves the right to demand from any successful tenderer a security deposit, in the form of a certified cheque or bond as above, equal to 10 per cent of the amount of his bid, to guarantee the proper fulfilment of the contract.
