W.C.T.U. CONVENTION ASKS FOR TOTAL ABSTINENCE FOR DURATION OF WAR

to the Prime Minister of Canada, the leader of the Opposition, and our local member.
"We the Halton County W.C.T.U. assembled in convention in Georgetown unanimously resolve that: Whereas our Empire is now facing the greatest crisis in its history, that the fate of our civilization is dependent upon the outcome of this struggle; and that the utmost of efficiency is necessary for the prosecution of the conflict; and that whereas the use of alcoholic beverages impairs such complete efficiency, diverts, to wasteful and injurious purposes, foodstuffs imperative to the sustenance of human life and lowers the moral and physical stamina of our soldiers. We do humbly petition our government to enact immediately total prohibition for the duration of the war."
