Lorne Greene, the voice behind The Canadian Press National news summaries which are heard over the CBC each night at 11.00 p.m. EDST, is a native of Ottawa and has been in radio less than a year. He gave his first station call at CBO last October and four monthe later was assigned to the news in Toronto.

He is 25 years old, six foot and a bit, holds a B.A. from Queen's University and spent two years in New York on a fellowship with the Neighbourhood Playhouse, His voice is one of the most distinctive in Canadian radio circles and has rapidly become a favourite with listeners throughout the Do-

Greene was born in Ottawa, February 12, 1915, just 25 years before receiving the boveted news assignment, Tall, handsome and tipping the scales at 186 pounds, his rich, dramatic voice reflects a schooling in the theatre, the lecture hall and the campus. He was an intercollegiate footballer and basketball player, majored in French and German, graduated from Queen's in 1937 with honours after a crowded scholastic career which included also the presidency

of the Dramatic Guild. Lorne thought he was going to be a chemical engineer when he entered college, but radio is his one obsession now. His philosophy is sound: "It takes hard work to get what you want and where you want and harder work to stay there." He has had considerable experience in production work in the theatre, two of his plays reaching the finals in the Dominion Drama Festivals of 1934 and 1937. Ife sings a little, plays the piano and writes music and lyrics in the popular style.
