The Treasurer was instructed to pay relief accounts of \$73.65 for the month of May.

A letter from Burlington Council, asking consideration for a motion which they had passed, regarding the forming of a home-guard unit for local defence, was dismissed after discussion, with the feeling that conditions in Georgetown at present did not warrant such action.

A request from the Horticultural Society that the dog by-law be more strictly enforced was rejected, and it was felt that the by-law was at present being vigorously enforced.

Mr. Percie Cox asked for the use of a room in the Town Hall on Sunday afternoons, where he could instruct some local boys in wind instruments. Council decided this would be granted, if Mr. Cox would assure Council that this was a free service and no charge of any kind was imposed on the boys.

Several communications re hospitalization accounts at various hospitals were read.

A request by Smith & Stone Ltd. that they be allowed to pay off a debenture which has still three years to run, was turned down.

Reeve Cleaver was strongly in favour of the town spending some extra money on the paving of part of the connecting link, which County Council has agreed to pave. Several property owners, he contended, wanted the road curbed, and this would mean a wider pavement than that planned by the County.

Mayor Gibson was just as strongly against this. "I am opposed," he said, "to spending \$1 on debentures this year. I am trying to keep this town out of the financial mess it got into in the past, and I cannot see a thing of four thousand dollar expenditure for such a purpose this year."

The Reeve brought up the problem of equalization of taxes, which had arisen at County Council last week. The present equalization has been in effect for twelve years and some of the townships feel that they are paying too high in proportion to other municipalities. It was decided to leave this matter in the hands of the Reeve, giving him authority to do as he sees fit at the next County Council meeting when the equalization problem will be threshed out.
