**IN OUR MAIL BAG**

To the Editor, Georgetown Herald, Georgetown, Ontario.

Dear Sir—

We have read an article appearing in last week's issue of the "Herald" and would point out that we have a considerable investment in our plant and property. We have no desire to arouse the animosity of the residents of Glen Williams by having purchased certain property for its particular location and suitability, we intend to make use of it and we will not countenance trespassing over this particular area, or over the private street that runs through the centre of the property. So far as this roadway is concerned, the Canadian National Railways insisted that it should be a private roadway and should not be open to public thoroughfare. It is our obligation to see that this is enforced.

On the other hand in order to retain the goodwill of the residents of Glen Williams we would point out that at the time we erected "No Trespassing" signs we provided a convenient right-of-way along the rear of our property. This right-of-way does not interfere with our plant operation and the public are free to use it during our tenure of the premises. This is, of course, not an acknowledgment of a right-of-way through our premises. It is simply an accommodation extended to the residents of Glen Williams by us.

Our premises are free to inspection by anyone who will take the trouble to get in touch with any of the undersigned. We are pleased with our location and within limits will do all in our power to retain the good will of our neighbours.
