

Winnipeg Summer Symphony Presents Concerts for CBC Listeners



The CBC has co-operated again this season in bringing the Winnipeg Summer Symphony concerts to National Network listeners. The series which began on Wednesday, June 19 at 11:15 p.m. EDT, will continue for 10 consecutive weeks, with Geoffrey Waddington conducting. Several important additions to the orchestra have been made this season and of unusual interest to music-lovers is the presence of Max Fleisher, internationally recognized oboe player. Mr. Fleisher is well known in Eastern Canada and has also played with the Washington National Symphony orchestra, under Dr. Hans Kinsler. He is shown above on the left. In the centre is Geoffrey Waddington, permanent conductor of the Winnipeg Summer Symphony Orchestra, and long recognized as one of the leading musical figures of Canadian radio. The important production features of the broadcasts will be in the experienced hands of John Kannawin, right, who has served in Canadian radio as writer, announcer, commentator and producer since 1930.
