The series which began on Wednesday, June 19 at 11.15 p.m. EDST, will continue for 10 consecutive weeks, with Geoffrey Waddington conducting. Several important additions to the orchestra have been made this season and of unusual interest to music-lovers is the presence of Max Fleisher, internationally recognized oboe player. Mr. Fleisher is well known in Eastern Canada and he has also played with the Washington National Symphony orchestra, under Dr. Hans Kindler. He is shown above on the left.
