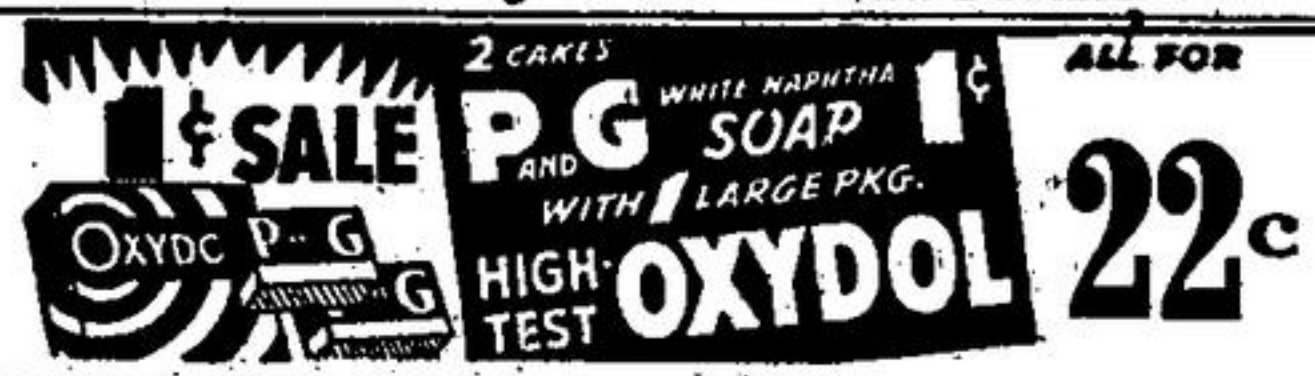
Weddings

WAR SAVINGS REGULATIONS BROADENED BY COMMITTEE

Answering the request of a number of patriotic groups in Canada, the War Savings Committee today announced the broadening of regulations covering the issue of War Savings Certificates. Certificates have heretofore been issued only to individuals, but these will be issuable in future to specific groups of individuals who wish to act in concert.

Limitations as to the amount of \$500 which may be purchased in any single year, and other conditions remain unchanged.

Under the new regulations, incorporated or unincorporated bodies organized for the purpose of carrying on, without pecuniary gain to their members, objects of a national, municipal, patriotic, religious, educational, char-

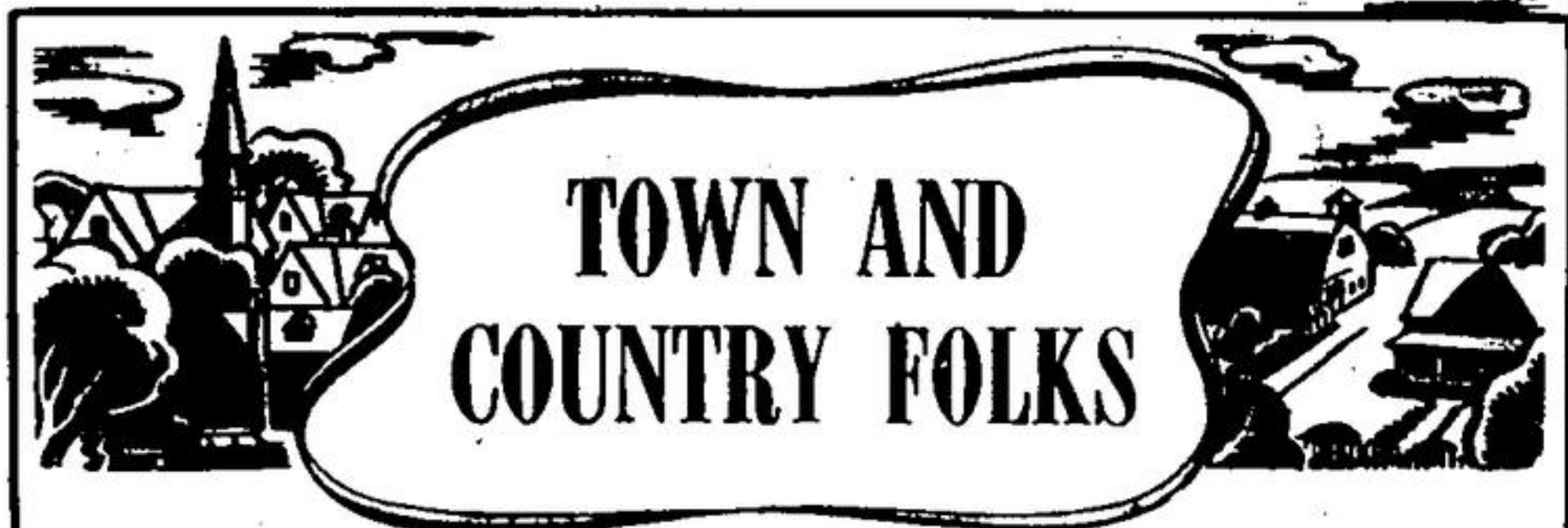
